DR. A. D. SMITH IS SEVERELY HURT

Knocked Down by Horse Sled on Way to Fire in Mecklenburg Street.

While No. 8 hose cart, from Union street station, was on its way to a slight chimney fire in a house in Mecklenburg street this morning about 9.30 o'clock, it struck and knocked down Dr. A. D. Smith, veteran Princess street dentist. The accident occurred at the corner of Princess and Charlotte streets and Dr. Smith received severe injuries. The fire team was moving down Charlotte street at a fairly fast clip. Dr. Smith was proceeding to his office in Princess street and was crossing the street. He had got about half way across when he noticed the approach of the fire team. He attempted to retreat his steps but before he could swing himself out of line of the fast approaching vehicle he seemed to become bewildered and was struck by the apparatus and hurled to the ground. He was carried to the hospital, where he was found to have a fractured and his fibrewid dislocated. He was also suffering generally from the severe shaking up which he received.

The driver of the hose cart was Alexander Smith. It was said today that when Dr. Smith was first noticed in the road by the driver it was too late to slow up or avoid the collision, owing to the fact that Dr. Smith seemed undecided whether to go ahead or return to the sidewalk.

The alarm was rung in from Box 78 for a chimney fire in a house situated at the foot of Mecklenburg street. The house, which is a wooden structure and of two stories, is owned by the Sterling Realty Company and occupied upstairs by Mrs. Reta Jones and downstairs by Mrs. W. Black. Little damage resulted.

Dr. Frank Smith, dentist, of Hampton, has been advised of his father's mishap and will arrive in the city this afternoon.

Speaking of additional accommodation at City Hall the Mayor said today that he would have a report ready on Monday or Tuesday. He had made one proposition the details of which he had considered sufficient to furnish the basis for some action by council but the matter had been referred back to him. The proposition referred to was the possible acquisition of the Jarvis building.

AWAY THIS AFTERNOON
The S. S. Montclair was scheduled to sail this afternoon for Liverpool with passengers, general cargo and mail. A special train arrived early this afternoon with passengers from Montreal and points west.

FOR SAFETY REASON
Between eighteen and nineteen persons are now in the epidemic hospital on account of diphtheria. Of this number the great majority are not suffering from the disease but have been infected to prevent their carrying the infection to others. These latter, while the germ is present in their throats and can be passed on from them to others are affected very little, or not at all by the disease and therefore are not properly patients. The common name for these persons is "carriers" and they are isolated merely for the safety of others.

FREED FROM SNOW; TRAIN ARRIVES

Valley Service Resumed—C. N. R. Normal—Shore Line Trains Still Stalled.

The Valley train, which was due in the city Wednesday afternoon but got snow bound at Black Rock, arrived at the Union Station this morning shortly after 9 o'clock. Efforts to extricate the train yesterday failed and last night another plow and more men were sent to help her out.

The C. N. R. officials report all passenger trains running today and their service back to normal. Work in the terminals is being held up owing to the quantity of snow, but crews of men are employed cleaning up and it is expected that conditions will be normal by the first of the week.

Aside from the Shore Line the C. P. R. are not suffering any inconvenience as a result of the storm. Both trains on the Shore Line are still snow bound and it is hoped to have them dug out by tonight. Snow plows and a crew of men are working endeavoring to dig them out.

Word was received in the city this morning that the Elgin-Havelock branch is not operating as a result of the storm.

R. roundhouse, who sustained injuries that resulted in his death on Wednesday, found that he came to his death by being struck by a slamming door resulting from the gale, no blame being attached to any one.

MANY PENALIZED FOR FAILURE TO MAKE TAX RETURN

Statements of Employers and Estate Managers Due This Month—Some Important Amendments in Effect.

Commenting on the fact that income tax returns for persons owning the management of estates, those having employes and incorporated companies which paid dividends in 1922—Forms 73, 74 and 75 were required to be filed on or before March 31, N. P. MacLeod, Inspector of Federal Taxation for the province, said today that a surprisingly large number of persons were penalized during the last year for failure to make this return. He added that an additional list of those liable to a penalty under the act was now being prepared.

Mr. MacLeod said that the forms, as well as those for individuals, T1, and for incorporated companies, T2, which were required to be filed by April 30, were available in all post offices throughout the province.

Amendments to Act.
An important amendment to the Income Tax Act went into effect this year under which the exemption of \$200 for each dependent child under 17 years of age is increased to \$300.

According to another amendment, commercial travelers are not obliged to include as an item of income amounts paid by employers for legitimate traveling expenses. By this amendment the charge of \$1 a day for the period spent on the road is eliminated.

Mr. MacLeod said that he was anxious to assist as far as possible all those wishing to make return and for this reason, any requests for information would be cheerfully complied with.

Present State of Lumber Market

Speaking this morning with reference to the late situation in New Brunswick, Alexander Wilson, of the Wilson Box Company, said that the lumber market went up and down like a barometer and that it was hard to tell from time to time what developments there would be. He said a great many small operators had gone into the woods to get out lumber for laths but the nature of the winter had been such that it had in many cases been a bad venture, and the small operators had been put out of business. At present the price of laths was high, but there was nothing stable about it. He did not know of any very large shipments of laths from this port, and in fact laths were scarce at the present time owing to there being so much snow in the woods. The general situation was fair.

The largest shipment of recent times from this port is one of 4,000,000 spruce laths which the schooner Harry A. McLennan is ready to take to New York. They are being shipped by Thomas Bell and Company.

J. Fraser, Gregory, of Murray and Gregory, said this morning that prices had advanced somewhat in the lumber market recently. This was due to a certain extent to the heavy fall of snow in the lower part of the province, which had forced many operators out of the woods and therefore very materially reduced the cut. The American market was strong but there still existed the embargo. Not a Canadian car was allowed into the United States with lumber, and even when the embargo was raised the lumber would have to be sent on American cars. Laths were strong but the same conditions which had affected other parts of the lumber market had obtained in connection with laths. The general condition was fair.


