SEARCH FOR BANDITS STILL UNSUCCESSFUL

Believed That They Are Headed Towards Prince Albert—No Trace Yet of McKay's Body

Prince Albert, Sask., Nov. 22.—The evidence tonight is strongly to the effect that the Steep Creek bandits, Carmel and St. Germain, are in the area between the north and south Saskatchewan rivers, about eighteen miles east of Prince Albert, probably coming toward the city.

Three residents of the district have been located who saw men who were apparently trying to keep out of sight as much as possible. The fee in the part of the south Saskatchewan river where the body of McKay was said to have been put into the stream was dynamited today but no trace of the body was discovered. A stone which it was said had been attached to the body to sink it was discovered.

It showed that it had been tied to the body by a rope made of strips of cloth of the inner coat worn by McKay. Desormeaux, the boy who was forced to help in the disposal of the body, said that this had been done and he took the searchers to a place on the river bank where the bandits had set up a stake to mark the place of the disposal of the body. Investigation of the place where the McKay car was buried in the bank shows that a most complete job was done. The wheels had been chopped off with an axe and the vehicle was so completely concealed that it would be most difficult to find it. The axe and a shovel were found beside the car.

There is a suspicion that the body of James Suger, the farmer who is supposed to have been murdered by the bandits, may be under the car.

Two more bandits have been found further down the river. They are connected by a tunnel, but bear no traces of having been occupied and there was no material of any kind in them.

LOCAL NEWS

The board of trade has received a suggestion, embodied in a resolution from the Board of Trade of St. John, that November 11, the date of the German capitulation, be made Thanksgiving day in this country hereafter.

The first class in first aid, under the auspices of the St. John Ambulance Association, was held last evening. Captain C. M. Pratt was the demonstrator.

Negotiations are on for the sale of the ferry steamer Ludlow. Yesterday Mr. W. H. Nugent, representing New York interests, arrived in the city and examined the steamer with a view to purchasing her for ferry service in Long Island Sound.

At a meeting of the social committee of the Y. M. C. A. last evening, Dr. J. R. Nugent was chosen president and F. D. McGuire secretary. It was decided to hold a smoker in the near future to which sister societies are to be invited.

The younger boys of the co-operative church groups were entertained at the Y. M. C. A. last evening. A lecture was delivered by A. M. Gregg by the Trail Rangers' Period. A baseball game took place between the Monarchs and the Warriors. The latter were defeated by a score of 15 to 2.

H. P. Robinson, general manager of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, estimates the damage done to their wires in the recent heavy storm at \$75,000. He says that it was the worst storm that has struck the company in its history. The bulk of the damage was done in Westmorland county.

A special meeting of the Royal Standard Chapter, I. O. O. E., was held last evening. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith presiding. A letter of thanks was read from Mrs. T. E. Girvan, superintendent of the diet kitchen, for a contribution of \$10. The report for a Christmas dinner for the 26th Battalion was given and that the amount will be cable to London next week.

CHURCH AND STATE QUESTION IN RUSSIA

Archangel, Oct. 20.—(Correspondence) The provisional government of the region of the Bolshevik regime which separated church and state, and final disposition of the question has been left until an all-Russian legislative power has been established.

Meanwhile the expenses of maintaining churches and other religious institutions will be paid by the various religious corporations.

The government has abolished the Murman regional soviet and re-established the zemstvo. W. W. Ermoloff has been appointed assistant governor-general to administer the districts of Kem and Alexandrovsk.

EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Among the officers elected by the Dominion Educational Association this morning were: Honorary presidents—The ministers of education for the provinces: New Brunswick, Hon. Dr. W. S. Carter; Prince Edward Island, H. H. Shaw; Nova Scotia, Dr. J. B. Macdonald; New Brunswick, Dr. David Sloan; Dr. W. Scott, and Dr. A. M. Scott, Nova Scotia; Colonel R. H. Campbell, Prince Edward Island.

Dr. W. S. Carter presided this morning. He showed a handsome medal, the Belgian Victoria Cross, which had been bestowed by the Belgian government upon one of their number, Major W. H. Hamilton, inspector of schools for Fort William, who won it by his devotion and efforts in teaching the science of agriculture during his stay in their country.

A resolution carried to send a delegation to interview the government for a grant of \$200,000 for the furtherance of technical education in the dominion, is still in resolution form.

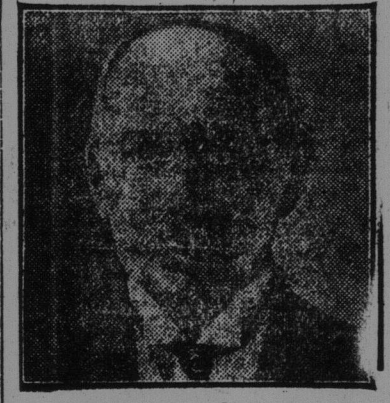
