London, Aug. 24.—Hopes that the labor troubles at Liverpool would be settled quickly have again been disappointed. Tom Mann and other strike leaders arrived in London yesterday from Liverpool and held a conference with representatives of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, as a result of which an ultimatum was sent to Premier Asquith, Sidney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, and the Lord Mayor of Liverpool, practically demanding the reinstatement of the Liverpool tranway men by noon to-day. In the meantime the situation is so acute that George R. Askwith, comptroller general of the labor committee of the Board of Trade, has gone to Liverpool to try and arrange matters.

Mann declares that it is the intention of the leaders to bring about a national strike unless the corporation yields.
