We are all Imperialists now, particularly those who do not constantly beat the Imperialistic drum and use the Flag for the basest of the contract of the same and the same are the same and the same are the same a partisan purposes. The only anti-Imperialists—if there be any—are those who are ists—if there be any—are those who are trying to deplet their party opponents as would be smashers of Empire. In short, the jingo is the only man whose Imperialism must be accepted with a grain of salt, and if the Empire ever comes to grief, on the shoulders of these exploiters of a lofty ideal for the basest of purposes will rest the responsibility. Lord Milner's Imperialism is of the genuine sort, although many of his ideas cannot be possibly accepted, at least by many Ganadlans, Australians or New Zealanders. Almost in the begin-Zealanders. Almost in the beginning the Great Pro-Counsel says that "it is a mistake to think of it (Imperialism) as principally concerned with expans of territory, with painting the map red There is quite enough painted red already. It is not a question of a couple of hundred thousand square miles, more or less. It is a question of preserving the unity of a a question of preserving the duty of a great race, of enabling it, by maintaining that unity, to develop freely on its own lines, and to continue to fulfill its distinctive mission in the world." Certainly no one can find fault with this definition of the object of Imperialism. The noble Lord carefully distinguishes Imperalism ism, looking upon it in essence as a sense of racial solidarity. The trouble with this way of looking at it, and acting in accord-ance therewith, is the fact that the people of the self-government Dominions are no of one race, the same being true of even the British Isles themselves. Among a population composed of English, Irish, Scotch, French, German and Dutch, a sense of racial solidarity is not easy to realize. A sense of a community of interests, of a common citizenship, a common danger, a common glory and a common ment methods and ideals, is conceivable without much difficulty; but an Imperial ism which aims at making all think, fee and act exactly as Englishmen, is a dream indeed. HOME RULE FOR SCOTLAND.

LONDON, May 20.—The Scottish Home Rule Bill passed is second reading to the House of Commons to day. In follows somewhat the lines of the Irish Home Bule Bill and was introduced by William Henry Covrans, mamber from West Aberdanshires.

The Bill represents a further instalment of the policy of devotation in listated by the Government of Scotland Bill. The powers given by the Bill to the Scottish Parliament include all those conferred on the Irlah Parliament, except the control of the ipost office, and the power to vary customs and excise, but with the addition of the administration old age pensions, national insurance and labor exchanges.
