## PLANS CONSIDERED FOR THE REBUILDING OF UNION ST.

Imperative That This Work be Proceeded With at Once — Proposed Location of Railway Tracks Will Necessitate the Widening of the Street by Thirty Feet — Owners of Property Required Will Not Sell, City Will Expropriate — Another Request From Wm. Thomson & Co. For No. 2 Berth.

The Board of Works held a meeting yesterday and considered the plans for the rebuilding of Union street.

The following were present: Ald. McGoldrick, presiding; Ald. Bullock, Rowan, Baxter, Vanwart, Lewis, Hamlin, Tilley, Sprout and Christie, Director Cushing, Engineer Peters, Div. Supt. Downie and C. P. R. Engineer Brown.

An application from Messrs. Morrison and Griffiths for lease of land on the south side of Rodney street, near mill pond, was received and was referred to the Safety Board.

Director Cushing read the agreement between Mr. Gibbon and the city for the use of the dredge. The director thought it would be an assistance at Sand Point and that it should dredge 100 yards a day and would be able in twelve or fourteen days to clear up No. 1 berth. He thought the dredge could be fitted out for \$20. He would put her to work for at least twenty days.

Ald. Bullock asked whether she could be used on the Navy Island bar.

Ald. Baxter showed that she could not, as she would have to be held in position by chains, which would interfere with the operation of the ferry boat.

Ald. Bullock: "What are you going to call her? The Penny Whistle?"

Director Cushing: "I suppose the Orange Peel."

Baxter: "After the chairman."

A communication was read from W. J. McCordock saying that he had notified Capt. James Wright to return the dredge to him at the service of the city.

Ald. McGoldrick wished to know where the board of works stood in the matter. This board had sent its own representative to view the dredge, while the city had been requested by the mayor.

To Aid Baxter, Director Cushing said there was a steamer at present at No. 2 berth, but when she leaves in a few days, the soundings will be taken. C. P. R. Engineer Brown will also act with the city representatives.

To Aid Bullock, Harbor Master Farris said that the Battle line could be moved out of the way while soundings are being taken. To this the board agreed.

Ald. Baxter thought the question of giving Capt. Wright his instructions should be left to the mayor. He thought that it was a good thing that the government's own expert should inspect the dredge, in case of national allusion at any time.

Ald. McGoldrick thought that James Dalton, Inspector of boilers, should accompany Mr. Wright.

Ald. Rowan made a motion to this effect.

Ald. McGoldrick said that if necessary, he would ask the department of marine and fisheries to allow Mr. Dalton to be away for the few days. This was decided upon.

### YORK COUNTY LOAN.

Several Thousand Shareholders Yet to Hear From.

TORONTO, Oct. 9. — The National Trust Company, liquidators of the defunct York County Loan & Savings Company, announced they have arrived at a point in the liquidation where they begin to see daylight in what was a chaos. A force of fifty or sixty clerks have been engaged on the work. Despite the wide publicity given to the matter, and the fact that the banks have been co-operating, several thousand shareholders in British Columbia, Quebec and other sections, have not been heard from, although the books have ceased coming to the trust company. So far there has been roughly a gross realization of \$300,000 in the sale of a portion of the lands, buildings and building material.

The chairman then took up the communication from Wm. Thomson & Co., stating that on some sections at the Levee wharf the water was as shallow as eighteen feet. They said that the Alana would be notified of this, and if nothing was done the turbiners could not come here, and in view of this they again asked for No. 2 berth at Sand Point.

Ald. Rowan thought the board should not take any further action, as the council had already called the attention of the government to the conditions.

Ald. McGoldrick was asked to inform Wm. Thomson & Co. of the previous action of the council.

Div. Supt. Downie then put before the committee a map of the proposed C. P. R. N. B. S. and street railway tracks on Union street. To allow the tracks in this position the street would have to be widened thirty feet. According to the plans submitted the C. P. R. tracks are shown much farther back than the old tracks, and the plan was before the board that they would be able to get to the new wharf. Back of these tracks are the N. B. S. railway and the street railway track.

Ald. Bullock asked whether it would not be possible to use what remains of the old tracks and also to only buy fifteen feet.

Engineer Brown did not think it feasible. The company, however, would like to have the part of the old track which still remains to be left to be used in the handling of immigrants.

Ald. Baxter suggested that now the plan was before the board that Supt. Downie allow the street railway to cross the C. P. R. tracks to give them access to Rodney wharf.

Supt. Downie said, however, that this was a matter for the railway commission. He said that there only remains 35 days to rebuild Union street, and he wished for authority to go ahead at once.

Ald. Bullock said that the street railway would probably not be built along Union street this winter.

Ald. Baxter said that he had been assured that the company were prepared to go ahead.

On motion of Ald. Baxter, it was decided to refer the matter to the same sub-committee to consult with the owners and decide if the land can now be purchased at a fair price, whether they should proceed by expropriation or refuse to renew the leases for the properties along the street when they expire in November.

The sub-committee held a preliminary meeting after the session of the board yesterday afternoon and met again this evening. If the owners of the Gordon Hall Works and the Shiel & Quinan property refuse to sell, it is likely that the city will proceed by expropriation in order to cause no delay.

### GIRL CHARGES FATHER

WITH SERIOUS CRIME

Thomas Doland, of Clarke's Harbor, Landed in Jail at Yarmouth.

YARMOUTH, Oct. 9. — A horrible story of depravity at Clarke's Harbor became known here today, when two young girls, sisters, aged fourteen and fifteen years, came to Yarmouth on their way to Boston. Their father, Thomas Doland, who served a term at Dorchester for stealing a large sum of money at Clarke's Harbor, and who immediately after his release, was struck by an intercolonial train while walking on the track and badly crippled, made his way to his home at Clarke's Harbor with his little daughters. Before the little ones arrived here Doland wired the police to hold them while they did. The man came to Yarmouth, but in the meantime the fifteen year old girl swore out a warrant against her father whom she charged with incest. Doland was looked up and will be sent to Barrington on Wednesday for examination.

Another man is now in jail in Shelburne county, awaiting trial on a charge of committing a very serious assault upon the younger sister.

STMR. BRATTINGSBORG FLOATED LAST NIGHT.

Joseph Jardine Seriously Injured by Falling from Vessel's Deck— Schooner Reported Aground.

CHATHAM, N. B., Oct. 9. — The steamer Brattingsborg, last night about 11 o'clock, after her deckload had been lightened.

Last night Joseph Jardine slipped and fell from the deck of the steamer Brattingsborg to the water, striking the steambot Mascot in his chest. Captain McLean of the schooner Greog, jumped overboard and rescued Jardine, who was brought home this morning. It is feared his injuries are serious.

A schooner, name unknown, is reported aground on Portage Island.

THE trial was begun yesterday at Gagetown yesterday Judge Laundry sentenced Stephen Panjov to spend one day in prison for manslaughter. On November 15 last, Panjov and his brother-in-law were shooting in the woods near Johnston, Queens Co. They had wounded a moose and were following it, when Panjov seeing something moving in the woods fired and killed William Kincaide.

At the coroner's inquest a verdict of accidental death was returned, but the crown officers later decided to prosecute, as Panjov had no license to shoot moose, and it was thought that a little more caution should have been exercised.

The trial was begun yesterday at Gagetown before Judge Laundry. Hon. W. P. Jones, solicitor general, prosecuted, and John R. Dunn and John E. Gibson, of Gagetown, appeared for the prisoner.

Judson Perry, Daniel Panjov, father of the prisoner, and Thos. Belyea, were witnesses for the prosecution, while for the defence the accused and Charles Norrith, T. Thomas and E. M. Todd gave evidence.

Panjov on the stand admitted that he had no license to shoot moose, and on account of this statement no real defence was presented. The jury after a short conference returned a verdict of "guilty" with a strong plea recommending to mercy. Panjov was sentenced to serve from the closing of the court till 2 o'clock this afternoon.
