REJANE HAS STRUGGLE WITH ENGLISH ACCENT

Acting on Inspiration, She Engages British Wigmaker to Fill Dual Role.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—Mme. Rejane has been troubled for some days by the seeming impossibility of importing the British and American accent into her Paris theatre.

She will shortly produce a play by Francis de Croisset, called "Paris—New York," and in this many of the characters speak, or should speak, English and American. A friend who was present at a rehearsal of the afternoon pointed out to Mme. Rejane that there was something inconclusive in the Anglo-American dialogue.

The words spoken, when they could be understood, did not sound like English at all; and the words which did sound like English were quite incomprehensible.

Mme. Rejane then imported two English masters from a commercial school in Paris, but they proved quite ineffectual, and matters became so serious that "Mme. Rejane was on the point of withdrawing the play, when she had a happy inspiration. "I was in despair," she said to me, "when I cried yesterday 'Eureka! I have it! That I believe, is my play!' added Mme. Rejane.

"The hairs in my play"—I think she meant wig—was the cause of the Englishman, Mr. Clarkson of London. I said: "He shall teach me what to say, and how to say it, those others."

And while Clarkson is now busily engaged at the Theatre Rejane fitting English wigs to the actors' heads, and installing the English accent into the heads of the actors, Mr. Clarkson, when asked how he enjoyed his new profession, replied:—"It is a very pleasant change," he said, "but Mme. Rejane is muddling people a great deal as to my identity. She insists on introducing me as 'Mr. Rejane' who comes to the theatre as 'Mr. Willis, our English teacher, the son of Clarkson Willis, the petting of London. It is not a very old," said Mr. Clarkson, "but I am not young enough to be my own son."

QUESTIONS OF JUDGE ANSWERED BY SPOOK

French Jurist and Police Inspector Try to Unravel Mystery of Haunted House.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—A judge, an inspector of police and the chief of the Grenobles detective force interviewed a mysterious spirit in Grenoble the other night.

The ghost is a rapping spirit, and it has excited Grenoble for some weeks past. It frequents the flat of an elderly woman named Mme. Massot, in a house which belongs to M. de Beylie, the presiding judge of the commercial court. It has worried Mme. Massot so much that she has called on her landlord to allow her to conceal her lease and leave the flat.

The landlord thought that his position as a judge made it necessary that he should disprove the presence of this rapping spirit, with the help of unromantic men of the police, in and out of uniform.

Five Grenoble policemen were posted on the roof, one was posted in every room of the house, and cordon of police was placed round the house in the street. In Mme. Massot's drawing room sat Judge de Beylie, his tenant, Mme. Massot, an inspector of police in uniform, and the chief of the Grenobles detective force.

At ten o'clock nothing had happened and the authorities rose to go. As they rose from their seats a loud rapping was heard, which seemed to come from the spirit of the room at once. M. de Beylie turned a little pale, but in a stern voice he asked the spirit to reply to his questions, "Are you a soldier or a civilian, you uncivil man?" he asked, glancing round for applause at his joke. "If you are a soldier, you may rap twice; if a civilian rap once; but please do not damage the wall."

Two raps answered the judge's question, and further questions elicited the peculiar story that the rapping was the spirit of an artilleryman 26 years of age, who had died before finishing his military service, and who was in love with Mme. Massot's niece.

Mme. Massot had opened her mouth to ask another question, or to remonstrate when midnight struck, and the authorities and the spirit all went home.

The mystery has not been elucidated yet, and large crowds collected round the house all day today. During the afternoon believers and unbelievers in the spirit came to blows and the wall was dispersed by the police, who did a little rapping on their own account.

WIFE USES TELESCOPE ON SWIMMERS; DIVORCE

Society Woman Watches Husband While in Bathing With Beautiful Rival.

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 16.—Sensational testimony, which is certain to result in an upthrust of the society circles of the fashionable suburbs of Bellevue and Avalon, was given today in the divorce suit of Mrs. Claudine Geer Van Pelt against her husband, Arthur Castell VanPelt, in which she charges him with infidelity.

The evidence against VanPelt was obtained by his wife and her friends by the use of a telescope, it being alleged that from a distance of 1,500 feet they watched him go in swimming with Mrs. N. R. Lewis in the Ohio river, off Neville Island.

All of the persons concerned are prominent in the Bellevue society, and Mrs. VanPelt and Mrs. Lewis are both women of unusual beauty. VanPelt is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania.

Mrs. VanPelt in her testimony, says that she was married to VanPelt in 1890, she at that time being 20 years of age, and he 19, they having eloped to Youngstown, Ohio. After the wedding he went back to Philadelphia to finish his college course.

One day Mrs. VanPelt found a picture of Mrs. Lewis in her husband's bureau. The photo shows Mrs. Lewis garbed in male attire.

The suspicions of Mrs. VanPelt were aroused, and she started to keep a watch on her husband. On July 10, 1906, she followed him and Mrs. Lewis to the Ohio river and saw them put out in a skiff for the shore of Neville Island.

Armed with a telescope, Mrs. VanPelt took up a position on the Bellevue side of the river and waited developments. Presently, she testified, she saw her husband and Mrs. Lewis emerge from the thick shrubbery along the shore and plunge into the water.

The testimony of Mrs. VanPelt was corroborated by other witnesses.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected with the land in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
