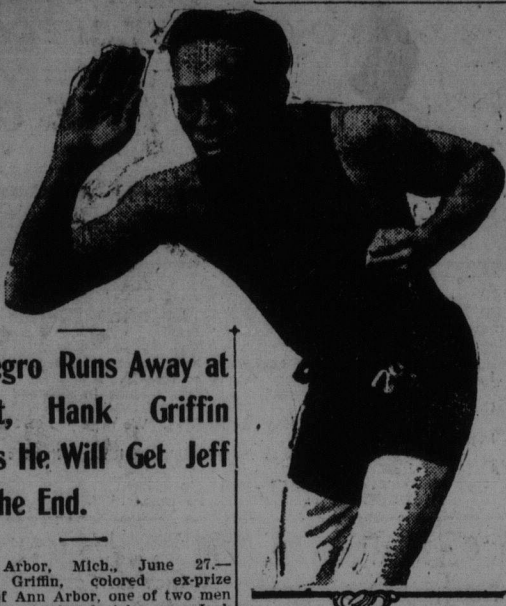

First Man to Fight Jeffries and Lick Johnson Talks of Mill



If Negro Runs Away at First, Hank Griffin Says He Will Get Jeff at the End.

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 27.—"Hank Griffin, colored ex-prize fighter of Ann Arbor, one of two men who ever gained a decision over Jack Johnson, and the first man who ever faced Jim Jeffries in the ring, thinks the colored man will win the big battle on the Fourth."

"Jeffries is going to do the rushing in this fight," he said, "and Johnson, following his old tactics, is going to keep out of his way. When Jeffries rushes him, Jack is going to be there long enough to hit and get away. He is the fastest runner that ever put on the gloves. He will tire out Jeff and then there will be nothing to it but one good Johnson wal-

lop and Jack will be undisputed champion. Of course, Jack never fought such a man as he is going to face this time, and he is going to fight differently and lose, for if he tries to rush Jeffries, it'll be a short fight and Jack will go down under the sledge hammer blows of the big Californian."

"I ought to know something about both men, for I taught Jeffries boxing for six months. This came about through my having a fight with him—17 rounds, for \$500, at Los Angeles. I lost to Jeffries. That was his first fight, and I was an experienced fighter then. After that I gave Jeffries boxing lessons till Corbett sent for him to see Carson City to act as sparring partner, while he was getting ready for the world's championship fight with Fitzsimmons. After that fight Delaney grabbed Jeffries and took him to the coast, three years later, he was champion of the world."

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"If ever the time comes I'll pay you for this," and Johnson answered, "I'm ready for you any time."

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3 RECORDS ARE BROKEN AT BLACKS

Archie Walsh Tops the Single and 14-String Mark and Ties McLellan's 3-String Score—Seven Spares.

Bowling fans on Black's alleys during the past week have seen some work at candlepins that has caused them to take notice. Two alley records were broken and one tied. Mr. Archie Walsh, a former North End boy, but who is now located in Boston, is spending his vacation at home and in his spare time is playing havoc with alley records. On Wednesday last he tied the three string record of 366, held by D. McLellan, rolling the remarkable scores of 128, 122 and 116. On Saturday he broke the 15 string record of 1693 held by H. F. Black since 1907, his strings were 92, 121, 100, 92, 103, 106, 112, 93, 91, 113, 96, 111, 140, 90—1612. His score of 152 up? That's something I am afraid to answer. I don't like the way they have been training. There is but one thing that makes me think it will be square, and that's this: In Los Angeles Jeffries has a brother, Jack, who looks like a better fighter than Jim. There was a match gotten up between Jack Johnson and Jack Jeffries. Johnson knocked Jack Jeffries out cold in four rounds, and then Jim Jeffries says to Johnson—

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there are a number of problems in the construction of motor speedways which have not as yet been solved. Dr. Wadsworth Warren, manager of the racing teams of the General Motors Company, which enters in races the famous Buick Roadsters, said regarding the new brick pavement of the Indianapolis motor speedway:

"The recent race meet at Indianapolis afforded an opportunity to test out a suitably banked speedway paved with vitrified brick. It was the opinion of all our drivers and mechanics, and of the other drivers whom we had opportunity to consult, that this track is faster than the Atlanta track, but more severe on tires, and that the vibration set up in the machines when driving at high speed has a more pronounced effect on both cars and drivers than is noticeable on the softer dirt surface of the Atlanta track."

Records of the recent meet at Indianapolis show that higher speed can be obtained on that track than at Atlanta, but in only a few instances was there a lowering of the records made on the circular, saucer-shaped, wooden surface track of the Los Angeles Motordrome. The oval track at Indianapolis has the advantage of a long straightaway for the homestretch, making the finish of the races more spectacular, but the starting wire is so near the first turn before they have gathered headway, and are inclined to skid down toward the pole.

Judging from what experience has been gained with new tracks to date, the ideal speedway would be a two-mile, saucer-shaped, perfect circle, with banking like that outlined above and such a track would amount to practically a continuous straightaway, which would not only be the fastest track in the world, but would in addition provide an element of safety to both the public and the drivers that has not yet been reached."
