FOOD SUPPLY FAILING IN ALASKA MINING CAMP

Although Gold is Plentiful in Iditarod, Provision Business Would be More Profitable than Mining.

Tacoma, Wash., March 29.—Iditarod, Alaska's new Eldorado, will be a hungry camp long before the first food laden steamship gets to its relief in June. Already the prices of its meagre supply of staples are on a scale that makes the provision business more profitable than gold mining. After another 12 weeks several lines of food will not be purchasable for money in any amount.

Reports of an impending food shortage have been drifting out all winter. One traveler headed for the Iditarod received a telegram warning against an invasion in any considerable numbers because of the great lack of necessities.

Valdez newspapers report the departure in the last 10 days of 200 persons bound for Iditarod. These men, who should reach their destination in less than thirty days, will considerably increase the demand upon the already low provision supply. A similar food shortage exists in the Innoko and Kuskokwim placer districts. Game comprises the only fresh meat obtainable.

MANY CHILDREN ATTENDED BIBLE SOCIETY SERVICE

Tercentenary of the King James Bible Observed at Monster Gathering in Centenary Church, Yesterday Afternoon—Inspiring Addresses Delivered by Rev. G. M. Campbell and Judge Forbes.

Centenary church was the scene of an inspiring assembly yesterday afternoon when the children of the city were gathered together to take their part in the celebration of the tercentenary of the King James version of the Scriptures. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Canadian Bible Society.

Through the kindness of the local school authorities the public schools were dismissed at three o'clock and this, with the perfect weather conditions, made a large attendance possible, the church being packed to the doors.

The younger children, who were dismissed at 2.30, preceded direct to the church and were given seats at the front. The older pupils left their schools at 3 o'clock and a large number formed in line to march to the church. The procession was headed by the Boy Scouts, the Scotch Cadets and the Pipe band.

On arriving at Centenary the children were seated in the body of the church, the gallery having been reserved for teachers and officers of day and Sunday schools, patrons of the Bible Society and others interested in the work.
