

## WHITE SLAVE STORIES TOLD AT A MEETING

Report to Local Council of  
Women Contains Start-  
ling Allegations of Im-  
moral Conditions.

Allegations of the existence of conditions that constitute a serious menace to the moral standing of the community were made yesterday at the annual meeting of the Local Council of Women, when a committee report Mrs. Paterson dealt with cases coming under the attention of members of the council. It was stated that by means of an advertisement in one of the local papers young girls were lured to places of evil, under the impression that they were to be engaged as domestics.

The opinion was expressed that white slavers were at work in a section of the city not far from the best business district, and that their operations were more extensive than was generally believed. There was a general feeling among those at the meeting that the conditions existing were most serious and warranted attention from the authorities.

Dealing with the practice of luring young women to places of infamy under the impression they were going to respectable houses for service, cases were cited which seemed to go far to prove the allegations. In one instance a country girl applied for work, was hired and after a few days in her new place was found living under deplorable conditions.

Another place was told of where a girl who had been living an evil life entered the employ of a factory. Other girls in the factory learning of her past had complained to the management and she was discharged.

On the other hand encouraging reports were received of the good work being accomplished by the Travelers Aid of the Girls' Association in protecting and caring for strange girls arriving in the city. It was felt, however, that there was a great need for a home where wayward girls could be reclaimed and made useful members of society.

Vancouver Flag in the Movies.

On the item of \$1,100 for moving picture censors.

Mr. Black said he did not often attend such shows, but when he did he usually saw a picture with the American flag very prominently displayed. What was wanted in this country were films with the British flag. Seventy-five per cent of the attendance of such shows were children, and that was the most impressionable period of their lives, and what should be cultivated most was feeling of loyalty to their own country, and this could not be done more satisfactorily than by showing stirring pictures of incidents of British history with the British flag in the foreground. Most of the films at present shown in this country depicted American national life, and all such films should be eliminated as much as possible.

Dr. Price explained that the flag was attached to the pictures and could not be taken off without damaging the films. If they didn't want the flag they would have to bar out the films.

Mr. Tilley said if people couldn't stand the sight of a picture of the American eagle they had better stay away from the shows. He did not think his honorable friend need be scared of Canadian children absorbing American ideas by looking at the flag, and he would be sorry to see the house take any stand on the question.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said moving pictures were greatly educative and very largely attended by children. The matter complained of was not one much for the censors as one of supply. There was no objection to the American flag being shown, the only thing was it didn't suit the Canadian people. The trouble was the lack of enterprise on the part of Canadian manufacturers of films. If there were more Canadian films manufactured there would be less necessity to import them from the United States. There were many subjects to be found in this country which would be eminently suitable for pictures.

Hon. Mr. Fleming agreed with Mr. Black, and from conversation with the censors he knew they agreed with him also, and they had refused to pass many pictures that had been sent them for review. They were doing good work and he would like to see them get more salary.

The committee reported progress.

Hon. Dr. Landry moved that supply be made the order of the day for Monday at 8.30 p. m.

The house adjourned at 6.26 p. m. until Monday at 8.30 p. m.

Hospital Bill Amended.

Fredericton, Mar. 13.—The bill to provide for balconies for the General Public Hospital was agreed to with amendments suggested by Mr. Baxter, requiring a two-third vote of the Municipal Council in order to have the work proceed, and striking out the amount of the bond issue specified in the bill.

The bill relating to the General Public Hospital of St. John providing for a loan of \$300,000 to provide a new

public hospital was taken up.

Mr. Tilley said that on several occasions he was opposed to the bill.

Mr. Baxter suggested that a two-third vote of the Municipal Council be required in order to have the project proceed.

Hon. Mr. Wilson favored such an amendment.

Mr. Tilley said that he believed that the present hospital was ample and he was opposed to placing further taxation upon the people of St. John.

Mr. Grannan said that he would like to hear the representatives of the hospital commissioners.

Dr. Thomas Walker, the chairman of the commission, asserted that St. John was fifty years behind the age in regard to its hospital accommodations. The committee decided to recommend the bill with amendments, providing for the two-thirds vote of the Municipal Council before the project could be proceeded with. Mr. Tilley alone voted against the committee's decision to recommend the bill.

The committee took up consideration of the bill to amend the Lancaster sewerage act and reported progress; this bill going over until next week.
