Desserts can be tempting

Ruskin once said "Cookery means care and inventiveness and willingness and readiness of appliances. It means the economy of your grandmothers and the science of the modern chemist; it means much testing and no wasting; it means English thoroughness and French Art and Arabian hospitality."

This week's column deals with tempting desserts — a delightful finish to any meal. Nearly everyone loves pie or tarts and so the first half of the column will feature these old-time favorites of mine.

Society is like a pie, there is the upper crust and the lower crust but the real substance lies between.

Pastry, if it is to be served at all, should be light and tender and flakey. My sure-method pastry recipe is as follows:

HOT WATER PASTRY

½ lb. lard or shortening

½ tsp. salt. Cover with ½ cup boiling water. Beat until creamy then let get cold. Add 3 cups flour. This can be used at once or kept in refrigerator till needed. Will roll smoothly when taken from refrigerator and will not crumble or break.

TAFFY TARTS

1 egg well beaten
1 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. corn syrup
1 tsp. cream
1 tsp. butter
salt and vanilla

METHOD:

Mix well and put in unbaked tart shells. Bake in hot oven 10 minutes. Remove from tins as soon as taken from oven.

RHUBARB CHIFFON PIE

½ cup sweetened rhubarb sauce
¾ cup sugar
½ cup water
½ pt. whipping cream
2 eggs separated
1 tsp. gelatin
red food colouring

METHOD:

Dissolve gelatin in cold water, beat egg yolks and add half the sugar. Cook until it will coat the spoon, over hot water. Add dissolved gelatin and rhubarb and set aside until it starts to set. Add food colouring and mix well. Beat egg whites, add remaining sugar and fold in. Pour into baked pie shell. When ready to

serve, top with sweetened whipped cream.

HANNAH'S LEMON PIE FILLING

2 lemons, juice and rind
1½ cups white sugar
2 heaping tbsp. cornstarch
1½ cups boiling water
2 large or 3 small eggs
piece of butter size of walnut
salt

METHOD:

Grate rind of lemons, add juice and boiling water; bring to boil and add sugar, salt and cornstarch. Boil a few minutes, add egg yolks and butter. When partly cool, put in baked shell. Use egg whites, beaten stiff with sugar and vanilla added for meringue. Brown.

APPLE CRUMB PIE

4 large tart apples cut in eights
½ cup white sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon
½ cup white sugar
¾ cup flour
½ cup butter

METHOD:

Arrange apples in pie plate. Sprinkle with ½ cup white sugar and cinnamon. Sift remaining ½ cup white sugar with flour, cut in butter till crumbly. Sprinkle over apples. Bake at 450 for 10 minutes; lower heat to 350 and bake 35 minutes longer.

Park Royal Teenage Centre opens

NOTICE OF APPLICATION to The Ontario Municipal Board by the Corporation of the Town of Mississauga for approval of a by-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 30 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Mississauga intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 30 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 7258 passed on the 29th day of May, 1968. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith.

Any person interested may, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Town of Mississauga notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law together with a statement of the grounds of such objection.

The Ontario Municipal Board may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered.

Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of the hearing is to be sent.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF MISSISSAUGA
BY-LAW NUMBER 7258

A By-law to amend By-law Number 5500 as amended.

THE COUNCIL of The Corporation of the Town of Mississauga, pursuant to Section 30 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1960, and amendments thereto, ENACTS as follows:

By-law No. 5500 as amended, being the Town of Mississauga Zoning By-law is hereby amended by deleting "or" in favour of "of" from Section 2, Subsection (13) so that Section 2, Subsection (13) will read as follows:

2 (13) "Family" means one person, or two or more persons inter-related by bonds of consanguinity, marriage or legal adoption and may include domestic servants;

ENACTED and PASSED this 29 day of May 1968.

Purpose of the By-law

To correct a typographical error incorporated during previous consolidations of By-law 5500.

Effect of the By-law

To clarify the definition of "Family" contained in the Town of Mississauga Zoning By-law.

Location of Lands Affected

All lands in the Town of Mississauga lying south of Base Line Road and lying north of Base Line Road west of the mid lot line between the east half and the west half of Concession Three, East of Hurontario Street, and including all of Lot One in Concession Four, East of Hurontario Street.
