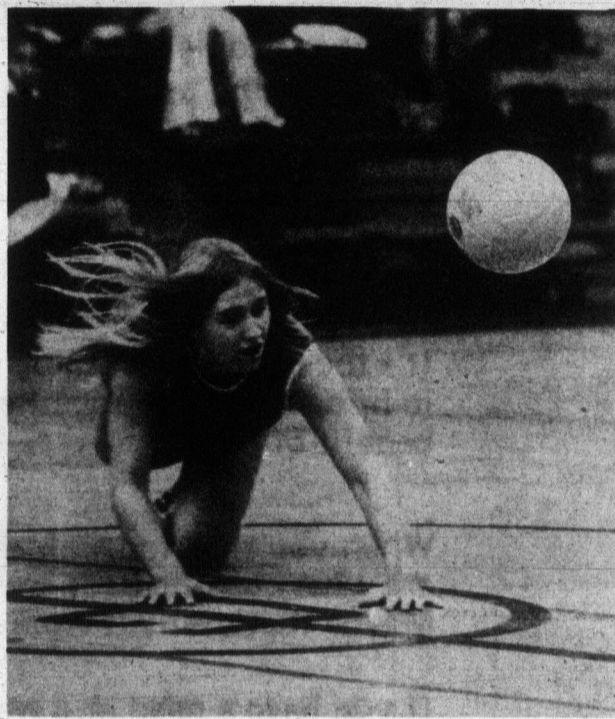
Grace . . . Karen Ginn is a gymnast. Obviously.

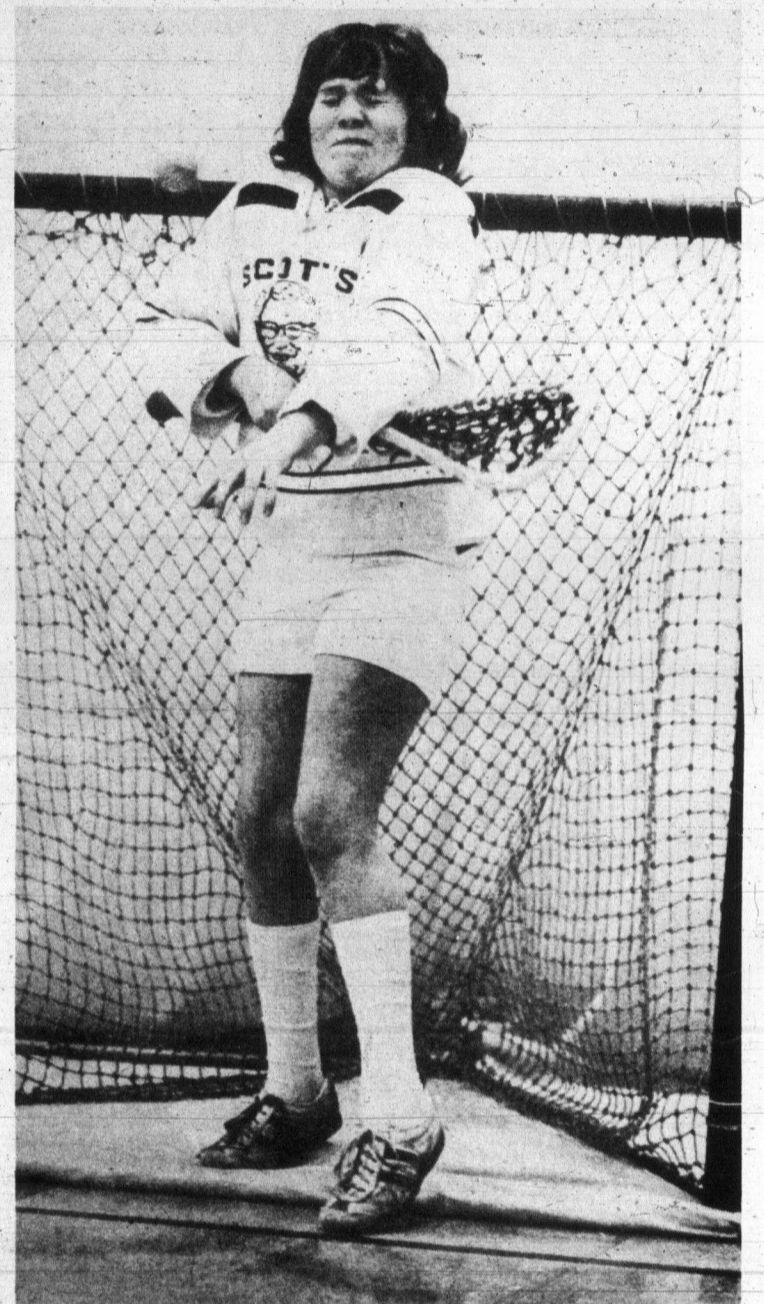

Times photographers Ray Saitz and Ron Pozzer have been the scene in search of beauty and sporting achievements all year. Here, we present a cluster of sports pearls.

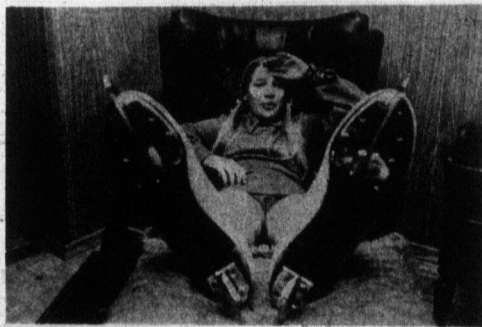

Don't look now . . . Sheri Stockflesh tries her hands at lacrosse netminding.



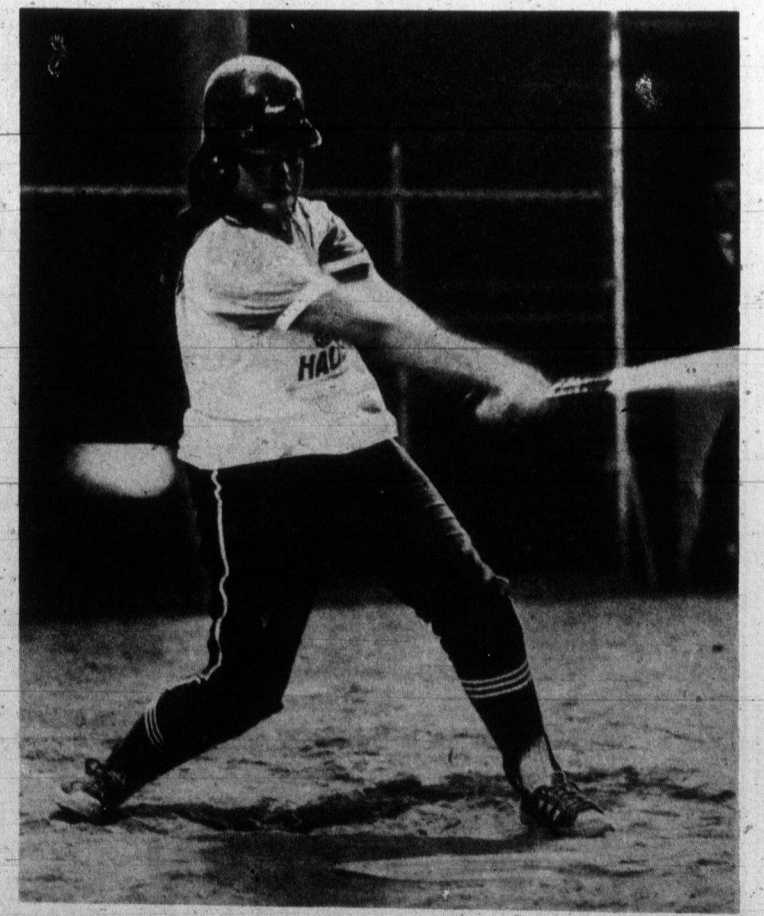
