In several discussions with me about the possibility of a meeting of Prime Ministers this year, Noel-Baker has referred to the 1st October as the deadline for the completion of studies concerning the United Kingdom's role in European economic cooperation. Although he did not specify what studies he had in mind, I think it can safely be assumed that he was thinking of the preparatory work being done for the United Kingdom's submission to the OEEC in connection with the programme for the entire four years covered by ERP (cf. paragraph 3 of my telegram No. 829 of the 9th June) and that these studies form the core of the thought which is being given here to the economic aspects of the tion of th At the same time, however, United Kingdom Departments are continuing to examine the problems which would be raised by the creation of a European customs union. It would be a mistake, I think, if the indication which I have given in this telegram that the United Kingdom authorities feel that there is little chance of a European customs union being formed should lead to any slackening in our investigation of the implications which such a customs union would have for Canadian trade.
