Council, a resolution aproving the proposal. The resolution passed almost unanimously.

Letters were also forwarded to the Mayors of all Ontario cities requesting their co-operation in procuring their respective councils to petition the legislature to confer full voting powers on married women who are tax payers.

Not the least encouraging of the many signs indicating the progressive character of our cause is the fact that the action taken in the Legislature and by some of the municipal councils has been entirely voluntary on the part of the members who favor woman suffrage. Than this nothing could be more satisfactory as an incentive to more active and concentrated endeavor on our side.

I earnestly entreat you, by all and every means in your power, to try and increase the membership of our Association. Let the executive officers make it an imperative duty to convene on each Tuesday of each month. Hold the third Thursday evening of each month as sacred to the Toronto Suffrage meeting. Let us make this the banner year in our history by ending it with votes for all women, if not provincially, at least in the field of municipal affairs.

As your President I thank you for your help and continuing kindness, for without these I could have done little or nothing to further the cause we all have at heart.

We women have engaged in this struggle because it appeals to the best that is in us. We hold it a precious privilege to labor that right and justice may at last and soon prevail.

Justice and liberty are the watchwords of our campaign, and I cannot better close this address than in the words of Henry George:
