Their work is done so quietly, so unostentatiously, that recognition—because uninvited—is but sparingly extended.

In alluding to the value and success of these institutions, tribute should be paid to the accomplished and devoted nurses. These young ladies are daily consecrating their gifts and energies to the alleviation of suffering—to the service of others. There is one of the noblest spheres in life and they furnish a lesson and example to those of us, who, outside, in the wide arena of business and social intercourse—the big hospital of the world—oft forget or neglect to extend even a trifling hand to ease the bruises and buffets which all experience.

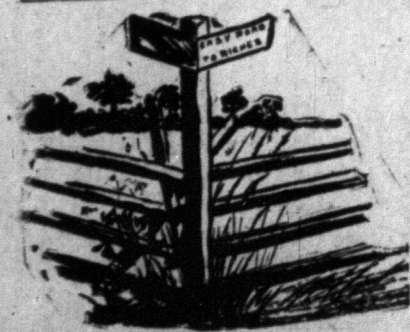
HOME STUDIES.

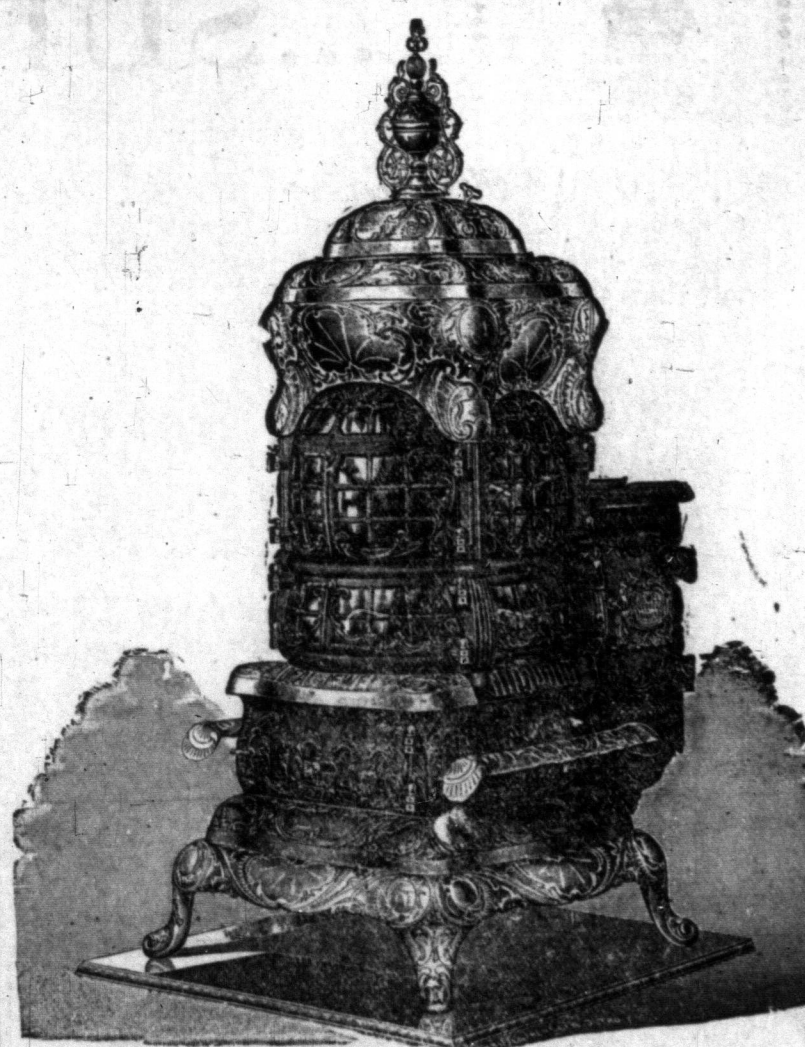
