Discussing the question of compensating hotelkeepers for the loss of their business, in case of the adoption of a policy involving a considerable reduction in the number of licenses, The Toronto News says:

"Two methods were employed in England, both of which appear to have produced good results. For a long time far-sceing owners of public house property have insured themselves against the loss of their licenses. Insurance companies write licenses. Insurance companies write that class of business as cheerfully as they do fire or marine risks.

One corporation is said to have £60, one corporation books at rates that are by no means high. It being possible to obtain insurance at reasonable rates, this is a plan that is within the reach of each license-holder. Indeed, with the state of public opinion in this country, ordinary business prudence would dictate the adoption of that form of protection. It has this advantage also, that it is perfectly fair. Any parliamentary method would probably treat good and bad alike, but a company can differentiate so that a high-class house, evidently supplying a public demand, shall not have to pay the same premium as a badly-conducted or obviously unnecessary house. Insurance companies are organized to protect the owners are organized to protect the owners of property that is liable to destruction, and that surely includes a renewal license in a community where a constant agitation for further restrictions is maintained.

'In the city of Birmingham another plan was adopted which brought out in a striking way how the trade can compensate the trade without interference. In that city it was agreed that the number of licenses was excessive. The owners therefore formed themselves into a limited company for the purpose of facilitating surrender and adjusting compensation.
The procedure adopted was as follows: An area having been selected for treatment, all the licensed houses therein were valued by a committee of owners, or by a valuator appointed by them. It was then determined by a joint committee of owners and magistrates which of the licenses should be allowed to lapse, and the owners of the houses were paid the value as previously fixed. Upon the principle that the trade done by the remaining houses had been increased by the closing of some of their number, two-thirds of the value of the closed houses was assessed upon the owners of the houses in the district. The remaining third, representing lost trade, was met by the owners of public houses over the whole city. Thus the matter was dealt with, and a substantial number of licenses allowed to lapse, every arrangement for compensation being made by the owners themselves, to their mutual satisfaction and with-

Of course, a good many people are opposed to compensation, leat it should be interpreted as meaning should be interpreted as meaning state recognition of the legal right of the license-holder to some equivalent for the loss of his license; but on the other hand there is no doubt that many people are deterred from insisting on a vigorous application of the axe by the feeling that it is not fair to take away a man's means of living, without some compensation. It is true that no man has any legal claim to a continuance of his license; but many people have a sense of fair play which they cannot express as a broad theory, and their sympathy is with individuals rather than abstract principles. Just as an aversion to capital punishment is responsible for the escape of many marderers, especially women, so the feeling against depriving a man of his living prevents a more general demand for license reduction. The methods outlined in the above extract appear to meet the objections both of those who are opposed to compensation on principle, and of those who are opposed to compensation on principle, and of those who object to the taking of a man's license without compensation.
