ONEIDA.

Oneida is bounded north-east by the Grand River; north-west by Tuscarora; south-east by Cayuga, and south-west by Walpole. The land is rolling, the soil loam, and the timber chiefly pine. In 1845, there were only 1,700 acres of land under cultivation in the township. It is well watered by several small streams, and there is a bed of excellent gypsum near the Grand River. The Hamilton and Port Dover road passes through the township.
