The latter occupied a seat by the side of his counsel. His honor's decision was awaited with much interest. On taking his seat Judge Landry im-

diately proceeded to deliver judgment, which was as follows: "To decide this application I feel the necessity of reciting some of the facts that my reasons may be better understood. The defendant is charged with having published a defamatory libel. The words published that are said to be defamatory are recited in the indictment. In themselves the words are clearly libellous and defamatory. The are defendant pleads the general issue the and puts on record another plea by

which he justifies the publication on two grounds, viz.: "1st-That the defamatory was true. "2nd-That it was for the public

It also permits the prosecution to answer by evidence the proof adduced by the defendant. The crown maintains by argument that under such conditions it would not avail the prosecution to convince a jury that the charges were false, if it failed in convincing it at the same time that the defendant had no

reasonable ground for believing that they were true. "The crown says that it cannot hope to so convince the jury as to the belief and the reasonable grounds therefor; and that under section 334 the defendant would thereby get clear. If that section is available to the defense under the present state of pleadings then the statutes protect the defendant to the extent of permitting him to publish defamatory matter, provided he can show that the circumstances justified him reasonably in the belief of the truth of the matters, and that in fact he did believe in their truth. My decision therefore on the demurrer does not go beyond declaring that the second plea is within section 910 and that the declarations in that plea, if capable of proof, show it to have been in the
