AGES OF TROLLEY CARS

They Require More and More Care as They Grow Older.

The average passenger in a trolley car probably has an idea that a car simply need be run on rails and the rails, whereupon it can, like the broom, go forever. 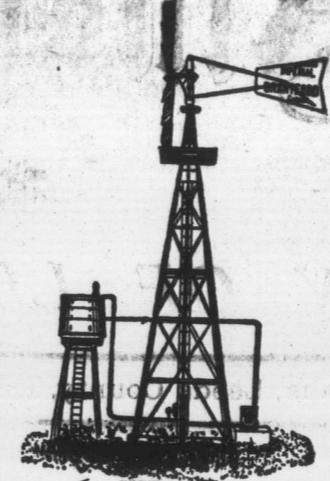

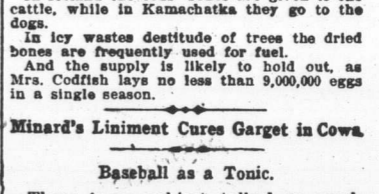
