MRS. GRANT'S FUNERAL

LAID TO REST IN THE TOMB OF HER HUSBAND.

Services Held at Washington and New York-The President and Cabinet Members Present.

New York, Dec. 22.—The body of Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant was placed in the great red granite sarcophagus beside that in which the body of her husband that in which the body of her husband rests, in Grant's tomb, on Saturday. The body arrived at Jersey City at 5.10 o'clock p.m. The black coffin, piled high with flowers, was carried on the shoulders of six men from the train to the army steamer General Meigs, which was awaiting at the pier alongside the Penn-sylvania ferry. It was escorted from the station platform by a detachment of Ulysses S. Grant Post, G.A.R., and by committee of the Grant Monument Association, which had accompanied the funeral party from Washington. tomb was reached a few minutes before 7 o'clock. Ulysses S. Grant, jun., and several close friends were there. coffin was carried immediately to the sarcophagus and lowered into it without ceremony of any kind and the lid

replaced.
The service at the sarcophagus yesterday began at 11 o'clock, and was brief. It was conducted jointly by Bi-G. Andrews and the Rev. Alexander Mackay Smith. Two hymns were sung by a quartette under the direction of General Horatio C. King.
