

PACKING HOUSES' DIRT

LIGHT BY A NOVEL. Alleged Trade Secrets of Revolting

THEIR ATROCITIES BROUGHT TO

Nature of Chicago Meat Canners Laid Bare-Justified By Official Inspection By Two Commissioners Sent By President Roosevelt—Conditions Are Revolting.

President Roosevelt has sent a message to Congress, re the atrocities as revealed by his two commissioners, and he affirms that the conditions are so revolting that immediate action is necessary as the present laws are inadequate to affect the reform desired. Upton Sinclair's Statement.

Upton Sinclair, whose novel, "The Jungle," related incidents concerning the Chicago stockyards which caused President Roosevelt to send two commissioners to disprove, as he believes, the facts alleged, but who, instead, has been justified by the official examination, has made the following statement:

"The American people now have be-fore them one of the greatest oppor-tunities of their lives; one of the crim-inal trusts, their enemies—and the very worst of them—has been caught with

"It is bad enough to levy an unjust tax upon the coal supply of the whole community, compelling the poor to freeze in winter or to levy such a tax upon transportation or upon oil; but, worst of all, is to deprive the people of their food supply, for food is the chiefest of their necessities. That is the beef trust.

"I have seen as much as forty pounds of fiesh afflicted with gangrene cut from the carcass of a beef, in order that the rest of the animal might be utilized in trade.

I lived there seven weeks, and saw with my there seven weeks, and saw with my own eyes how business is conducted.
