Hamilton Grocers' Wholesale Co. Makes Startling Claim.

Tell Tariff Commissioners Rodpath Sugar Refinery Had Refused It Goods, and That Starch Manufacturers and Vegetable Canners Had Been Forced by Guild to Decline Orders From Them.

Hamilton, Nov. 25 .- The Tariff Com missioners spent a busy day yesterday with the manufacturers of the city. They will complete their work here Saturday at noon. The stove manufacturers put up a strong plea for more protection. They complained that there had been an extraordinary increase during the past two years in the number of stoves imported from the United States. They complained particularly of the way the Americans were cutting into the trade of the west. One reason was that the American enjoyed more

favorable freight rates.

The Grocers' Wholesale Co. made the most startling claim. They said that they had been refused goods by the Redpath Sugar Refinery, which said that its whole output was controlled by the Wholesale Grocers' Guild, and that it would be necessary for the wholesale grocers to join that guild to get goods. The starch manufacturers, canners of vegetables, and so forth had been forced by the guild to decline orders from the wholesale grocers, and for this reason the grocers asked that all these articles should be placed on

A large number of individual firms preferred requests affecting their businesses, some for more duty and some for none at all.

### LIFE CABLE SNAPS.

Delayed Work of Rescue From Steam er Argo Aground on Sandbar.

Holland, Mich., Nov. 25.-During a errific storm on Lake Michigan Thurs day night the steamer Argo went hard

aground on a sandbar.

Owing to the heavy sea which is running it is impossible for the liferunning it is impossible for the life-saving crew to reach the steamer, and it was decided to remove the endan-gered passengers with the breeches' buoy. At 1 o'clock the cable used to haul the breeches' buoy parted, for-tunately while the buoy was being haul-ed back to the steamer for another passenger. At the time this accident ccurred there were seven passengers and the crew of 22 men remaining on

the Argo.

The life-saving crew again took to their surf-boat, and the last man of the crew of the steamer Argo has been brought ashore. Capt. Stewart is still on the steamer, which, unless speedy aid comes, will surely go to pieces. The Argo is a steel steamer of 740 net tons, 178 feet long, and 31 feet in beam. She s valued at \$90,000.

FOUNDERS IN FORTUNE BAY. P. E. I. Schooner Goes Down With the

## Sunday Cigar Selling.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—The charge against Thomas Skeasy, an employe of the Empire Hotel, for selling cigars on Sunday was dismissed by Magistrate Kingsford yesterday. The magistrate said that if his employer used his services in a lawful manner, he is entitled to be discharged; that a hotelkeeper does not come under the prohibited Sunday classes; that if the hotelkeeper were charged with a breach of the act by selling cigars to his guests on Sun-day the charge would fail. The bona fide guests of a hotel are as much en-titled to smoke as eat. The case was instituted by the morality department at the instigation of the Lord's Day

Killed by a Hose Wagon.

Owen Sound, Nov. 25.—Thos. Christie, member of the Christie Bros. hardware company of Owen Sound, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon by the heavy hose wagon runing over him. He was a member of the fire brigade, and in attempting to board the hose wagon while the lat-ter was going to a fire, he missed his footing and rolled under the wheels, dying a few minutes after. The deceased, who was 35 years of age, leaves widow and three small children.

Crushed by Load of Wood. London, Nov. 25.—Charles Hall, a farmer about 35 years of age, who lives in the vicinity of Parkhill, met with a nost serious accident while driving a load of wood into town Thursday. The wagon upset, and the load fell on Hall, crushing him badly and breaking one leg, one arm and several ribs.

Windsor Marriages Illegal? Windsor, Nov. 25.—Said one of the leading lawyers of the city yesterday: "If the recent decision of the Attorney-General holds good, then all the marriages performed for Detroit cou-ples in Windsor for the past forty years are illegal. Other legal opinion coin cides with this.

Prison For Knife Wielder. Berlin, Nov. 21.—Rheinhart Bauman of Waterloo was yesterday sentenced to fifteen months in Central Prison by Judge Chisholm, for having stabbed a man named John Kropf, with whom he had a quarrel over a girl.


