Colleges Stick to Seven Men Teams.
The six man game will not be adopted by the Intercollegiate Hockey League this season. At a meeting of representatives of the four colleges, King's, Acadia, U. N. B. and Mount Allison, at St. John, N. B., it was decided the only change in the rules of the league last year should be the adoption of three twenty minute periods. The schedule for the season was drawn up and the prospects are bright for another successful series of games.
It was generally thought that the six man hockey, as advocated by the U. N. B., would not be adopted. Acadia and Kings were not in favor of it and it was believed that they would vote against it at the meeting. The three periods proposition is a popular one, however, and its adoption will be welcomed by followers of the league. As a result of the change, the games will be faster and more exciting.

The King's College team, 1913 champions of the league, will meet for their first practice game in Windsor on January 8th. As the league does not commence until February, the various colleges will in all probability play several challenge games in January. The King's College team and the Dalhousie seven will meet either at the arena or in the Windsor rink some night early this month.
