Musk-rats, whose mounds are visible in the marshes, are also numerous, and are once familiar objects on our fresh water marshes are now scarcely met with, except in out of the way places.

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Mt. Allison Lecture Course.

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The total crude gypsum produced in Canada in 1886, may be estimated at about 162,000 tons, nearly all of which is mined in Nova Scotia. The value at the point of production was \$175,742; of this about 7,000 tons was calcined and manufactured in Nova Brunswick into about 51,000 barrels plaster of Paris, valued on the spot at \$51,000; about half of this plaster of Paris was sold in Canada, and the remainder was exported to the United States. Compared with 1885, it is estimated that the increase of 1886, in the production of crude gypsum, was about 50,000 tons, Nova Scotia alone adding 36,000 tons to the increase.
