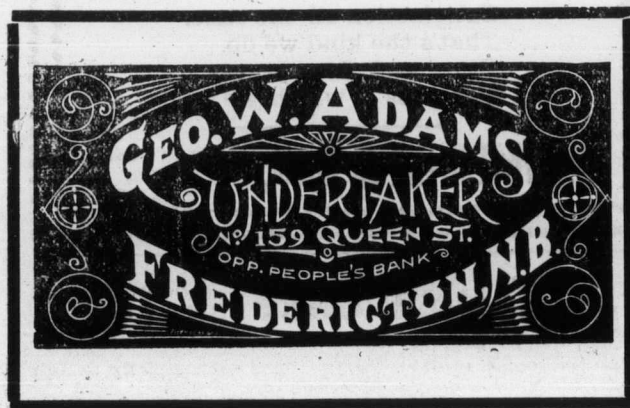

## DOMINION COAL COMPANY

Annual Meeting of Company at Montreal This Morning--Financial Reports.

SHAREHOLDERS SATISFIED WITH YEAR'S WORK.

MONTREAL, June 13.—Nothing was said at annual meeting of Dominion Coal Company this morning regarding amalgamation with the Dominion Steel Co. The directors elected were R. B. Angus, F. O. Pearson, H. Dincks, James Ross, Isaac J. Forger, W. H. Ross, Hon. D. McKee, Sir W. C. Van Horne, J. S. McLennan, H. M. Whitney. The financial statement shows that during the fiscal year ending February 28 the sales increased 250,000 tons. The delay in delivery of machinery, increased cost of supplies and advances in wages not only interfered with filling the increased demand but lessened the profits on the quantity shipped. Since the close of the fiscal year the sum of \$84,745.30 has been added to the reserve sinking fund, which with interest on reserve sinking fund is sufficient to retire \$80,000 of the Company's bonds thus reducing the bonded indebtedness to a total of \$7,745,290. According to the treasurer's statement the net income for the fiscal year from all sources, with deductions, renewals, and extensions at mines, amounted to \$85,281.88. H. M. Whitney was subsequently re-elected President.

## PRESBYTERIANS IN SESSION.

The General Assembly of Canada Meeting at Ottawa.

The Business Before the Meeting This Morning.

Case of Dr. MacRae of St. John Settled by Assembly.

OTTAWA, June 13.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian church, in session this morning, listened to a petition from the Presbytery of St. John, N. B., regarding the status of ex-Principal MacRae, of Morris College, Quebec, who now resides at St. John. After presentation of motion and deliverance of a number of addresses explanatory the general assembly unanimously resolved to grant him standing of constituent member of St. John Presbytery, in which he spent so creditably the greater part of his ministerial life in Canada. J. W. McMillan was invited to act pro tem as assistant clerk, inasmuch as the regular clerk had been called to the moderator's chair. The names of several ministers of other denominations in Canada, the United States and elsewhere, who desired to sever their connections and become identified with the Presbyterian church in Canada, was sent to a specially appointed committee to report on. A similar disposition was made of applications on behalf of students from different places.

## FAVORABLE CROP REPORT.

An Official Bulletin for Manitoba Just Issued.

Large Increase in the Acreage Under Cultivation.

The Prospects for a Good Crop Are Very Favorable.

WINNIPEG, June 13.—The Department of Agriculture has just issued an official crop bulletin. The acreage under cultivation shows a marked increase over last year, the total acreage under all crops being 2,661,460 of which 2,910,321 is grain. Last year the total acreage under crops of all kinds was 2,122,560. The seeding season was remarkably favorable and farmers are reported as jubilant over the present prospects and splendid growing weather.

## THE SOUTHERN TERROR.

Negroes at the Mercy of a Lawless Mob.

A Feud Ends in the Murder of a Prominent Citizen.

And His White Friends Demand Revenge.

SHREVEPORT, La., June 13.—Reports from the Foster plantation where John Gray Foster was murdered yesterday say a dozen or more frightened negroes are cowering in the Kintebrew's store surrounded by a big mob which threatens every moment to lynch the whole party. Foster Edwards, the negro who is charged with firing the fatal shot, has not yet been apprehended, however, and it is the decision to get him that has restrained the mob thus far. Blood-hounds are being used on his track but so far as known he has eluded his pursuers. The negroes imprisoned in the store are frantic with fright. They are officially in the hands of the authorities, but they realize that their real captors are members of the white mob which has guarded every avenue of escape since yesterday. Foster was a young man well known, a brother-in-law of Governor McMillan of Tennessee, a member of one of the leading families of Louisiana. Trouble has been feared for some time between the negroes and the overseers. Foster thinking he could succeed when the others had failed started for the negro quarters yesterday. The negroes were gathered in a cabin and he was some distance away when the shot which killed him was fired. The negroes immediately scattered and all but Edwards were quickly captured.

## HEWITSON INQUIRY.

The Coroner's jury in the Hewitson inquest met this morning to make up their finding. Coroner Seery told the jury of the condition of the body of the late Col. Hewitson when he examined it, and that there were no marks or evidences of violence upon it. Death might have resulted from any one of several causes, but exactly what was the cause of death he could not tell. Mr. Crocker briefly went over the leading facts as brought out in the evidence, and pointed out to the jury that if they or a majority of them were not satisfied as to the cause of death that they had in their power to order the remains exhumed and a post mortem held.

At four o'clock the jury brought in the following verdict: That John Hewitson's death was caused by the excessive use of alcoholic liquors consumed on the premises of Newton Lee, and by the culpable neglect on the part of the said Newton Lee in leaving him in a cold room and in not making more strenuous efforts to send him home at an earlier hour on Saturday, the 27th day of April last.

## CHINESE INDEMNITY.

The Proposals of America Receive Consideration of the Powers.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A special to the N. Y. Herald from Peking says: At the meeting of the diplomatic corps held yesterday (Wednesday) reduction of the claims was proposed by the Americans and was definitely rejected. Secretary Hay's proposal to submit vouchers for the claims to the tribunal of the Hague was taken into consideration. If the ministers voice the views of their governments there is hope for its acceptance. The tax on salt, the native customs dues, and the tax on grain, which have been conceded, amply guarantee the indemnity.
