

IT IS FALSE SAYS BARROW.

Pump House Officials Deny That Sand Injures Pumps. Changes to be Made on Catharine Street Begun To-day.

Engineer Instructs Assistants to Go Over Street Railway System.

The letter that Engineer McFarlane, of the Beach pumping station, sent to City Engineer Barrow a week ago, reporting that sand, said to have been stirred up by the sand-sucker, was entering the pumps, was not made public nor brought before the Fire and Water Committee because Mr. Barrow considered it a private communication.

"I have every respect for Mr. McFarlane," said Mr. Barrow, "but he has proved so changeable and biased on this water question that I really place little confidence in what he says."

When I got this letter I went to the Beach and satisfied myself that no sand was coming in. Mr. McFarlane said if the water was kept high it would be all right. I told him to let me know if there was further cause for complaint. I have not heard from him since, so I take it for granted that everything is all right.

Mr. Barrow called up Engineer Bain this morning and asked him if it was so that the valves were being injured. Mr. Bain said a little sand had got in about a week ago, but that there had been no further trouble from that source since.

The Radial Company began to-day the work of laying the tracks from King to Main, on Catharine street. As soon as this is finished the work of paving the street with vitrified brick will be proceeded with.

The city asphalt plant will close down to-night. It may have to be reopened again if the street railway takes up the tracks on James between King and Main street, as ordered to do by the Railway Board, the city to furnish the material and do the work.

Building permits were granted to E. Hill for two frame houses on Macaulay street between John and Catharine, and to J. Lyne for a brick cottage on Birge street between William and Wentworth, to cost \$1,300.

The Board of Hospital Governors yesterday afternoon definitely settled on the Victoria avenue site, adjoining the works and station, for the Home for the Advanced Cases of Consumption. The architects were instructed to rush the plans, and the work will be gone on with at once.

WEATHER NOTES. The high pressure system, which is situated over the eastern portion of the continent, has moved very slowly since yesterday morning, checking the progress of the depression covering the western states.

NEW FIRE ENGINE.

Test Made at Bay Yesterday Was Quite Satisfactory. The new fire engine, purchased by the city, was given a test, yesterday afternoon, by Chief TenEyck, as to its sucking qualities. The engine was taken to Browne's wharf, at the foot of MacNab street, and was put to work. It took just nine and a half minutes to get the steam up to 100 pounds, and two minutes later, it blew off at 140 pounds.

Blowing off the very high wind that was blowing off the bay, no accurate tests could be taken as to the length of steam thrown. Three one-inch streams threw the water 136 feet, while two lines of hose, running into what is called the Siamese nozzle, threw the water 200 feet.

Chief TenEyck expressed himself as well pleased with the engine, and was of the opinion that the city could not have secured a better one, for the money invested. The engine ran smoothly without stop, for four hours, during which time there were three lines of hose laid from it.

A number of the aldermen and city officials were present, and watched the test. Ald. Clark said he thought the engine was the best yet.

Mr. Hugh Cameron, Superintendent of the Waterworks Engine Works, who built the engine, was present, and was pleased with the manner in which it did the work.

JOHN D., JUN., Resigned Leadership of Young Men's Bible Class.
