
Working Steers and Balky Horses

The following rules for training working steers are worth knowning by all who use the labour of these patient animals :-

1st. Cultivate feelings of sympathy and attachment toward the animals.

2d. You cannot keep them too tame and fond of you by frequently rubbing them with the hand especially about the head and neck. The pressure of the hand on a tame animal wool, but what we have ourselves, let us have as good as we raise. Let the bim more completely under your control.
