BAPTISTS MEET HERE NEXT WEEK

NO LIQUOR AT CAMP SUSSEX

The military camp at Sussex will be "dry" again this year. The cantenons will not be allowed to sell any refreshments of an intoxicating nature, and the use of liquor in any form will be positively forbidden in the officers' mess, or any other institution of a regimental nature within the camp. It is understood that the order this year will include a regulation whereby the officers' mess, band stand and regimental, must be closed by 11 p.m. and the hours during which the cantenons will be allowed to remain open will also be limited. It was noted last year at Camp Sussex that while some of the men managed to secure liquor at times, the purchase of it in the camp grounds was difficult, and the general order was better on this account.

GAVE HIS LIFE FOR ANOTHER

South Porcupine, Ont., June 2.—Stewart L. Maclelland, of Ottawa, mining expert and broker, was drowned in Parkey Creek while attempting to rescue Leo Dore, aged 16, who was also drowned by the capsizing of his canoe. Dore's sister clung to the canoe and was rescued by D. E. McRae. Maclelland plunged in after Dore, and failed to rise again, but in the excitement was not missed for an hour. His body was found entangled in weeds.

LECTURE ON CHINA
