The death sentence passed upon Elmer Mann, convicted of the murder of his mother-in-law in Montreal, has been changed to penitentiary for life, by an order in Council sanctioned by Lord Minto.

Donations of cash, fuel or clothing for the benefit of the poor, will gladly be received by the members of the conference.

In the evening the Stations of the Cross were erected by his Lordship, assisted by the attending clergy. The sermon on this occasion was preached by Rev. Dr. Doyle. The services were brought to a close with solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. A collection amounting to \$150 was taken up. The new St. Joseph's is a very handsome church, and the parishioners and their worthy pastor, Father Reid, deserve to be congratulated on having the work brought to such a happy conclusion.
