How the Daylight Saviug Bill is Regarded in Germany.

What is a Philistine? Of at least hundred definitions the one which pleases me the best is, the Philistine says to every new and sensible proposal, idiotic nonsense. He amuse himself over everything and anything that he has not been accustomed to see, hear, etc., opposes any alteration in his common-place way of life finds everything absurd that anyone else does because it is different from what he does himself; is the moral enemy of all progress, but enjoys when it has been carried through In Faust it is said "We are used to people despising what they do not un derstand," and I am sure the idea o an increase in the enjoyment of the sunlight by mankind, which is now being seriously considered in England, will at first be received with laughter by the Philistines of all na-tions. But this does not prevent the same Philistines from enjoying the advantages of the idea, forgetting the author of it, and behaving with the same indestructible philistinism

At the Next Opportunity.

Now for the facts of this case: member of the English House of Com-mons, the very praiseworthy T. W. Dobson, has brought in a Bill which proposes that on the third Sunday in April all clocks in Great Britain shall be put forward one hour, and back again one hour on the third Sunday in September. The gain in sunlight and bright hours for work amounts to 154 hours in a year. Mr. Dobson said in opposition to the Philistines, who are naturally not lacking even in parliaments that he himself "at first considered the proposal to be laughable absurd and impracticable." There is more joy in heaven over one Philistine who repents than over one man of progress who has not added to his knowledge. Neither in public nor it private life are there any insuperat difficulties to be overcome. The English railway companies estimate their saving in lighting expenses at two million marks and their savings in other ways would be still greater. I am sure that after a cosmopolitan philistinism has laughed at it a little, the law for enriching the life of mankind by an hour's sunlight will penetrate

Eventually Also Into Germany. To bring this end a little nearer is the object of these remarks. At present who rules the time of our getting up and going to bed? Simply the clock, and the customs that we regulate by it. The position of the sun has as good as nothing to do with the beginning and end of our day of work and recreation. Sunrise and sunsets have no connection with the so-called beginning and ending of our day. The limits of our day are decided by custom, and not by the position of the sun. There is, therefore, not the slightest natural inner necessity for them. If in summer the clock be put forward an hour, and all arrange-

ments of the day are performed in

obedience with the hour which has

whole hour's sunlight. Now it is clear that, unless they are forced into it, no entire population of any country will ever decide to rise an hour carlier than usual, and correspondingly to go to bed earlier. All friend ly advice, all grounds of commo sense, all the clear advantages early rising, convince no one who is not convinced without them. Man-kind is governed far less by common cant, imponderable, very often

Senseless Impulses and Customs. if with the agreement of the German Ringdoms, and the approval of the Reichstag, the clocks were put on an hour, from April 1st to September 30th, no one would talk of it any more. Even the Philistines would not understand how the Government could have been stupid enough not to hit on this arrangement years ago. It needs no decisive alterations in public life, the hours of service for the Courts would emain the same, inland railway timetables will not be altered, hours of work in manufacturies, mercantile houses and banks, meal-times in families—they would all remain as they are. Only the enormous difference would be that work in summer would begin an hour earlier by the sun, and end at an earlier hour by the sun, so that all men who work with their ninds or their hands, will enjoy an our more sunlight daily after their work is done. Do not hold up against me that one of the results would be the shortening of one's night's rest by an hour. Whoever gets up at 7 in-stead of 8 will of their own accord and the necessity of going to sleep an hour earlier. Our whole conception of daytime depends on our clocks. Do you think that after the introduc tion of Summer Season Time every one will say in the evening when the clock it at 10 or 11

Really it is Not so Late, it is Only

9 or 10"? That would be sheer nonsense, for there is no such "really." It is 10 or 11 because our clock and all other clocks say so. Also you may depend on it that the few lovers of night who made use of this "really" would soon be forced to learn, by the overwhelm ing power of everyone else, that 12 is 12 and nothing else. Our whole private and public life in summer after the introduction of this reform. will not only gain an hour's sunlight but something invaluable in freshness. For all adult workpeople the advance of the hour means an hour's greater freshness in the morning and an extra hour's light in the afternoon Workers of all kinds and officials would receive a whole hour more daylight for recreation and the occu-pations of family life. All this is so incontrovertible, so simple, that on nust be a confirmed sceptic in order to discover insuperable difficulties. make a whole nation rise at seven in stead of eight in summer. 



Put a good-sized lump of salt into a cup of vinegar and put into the vessel that is discolored and let it stand for half a day. Wash well with warm water and soap and sediment will
