



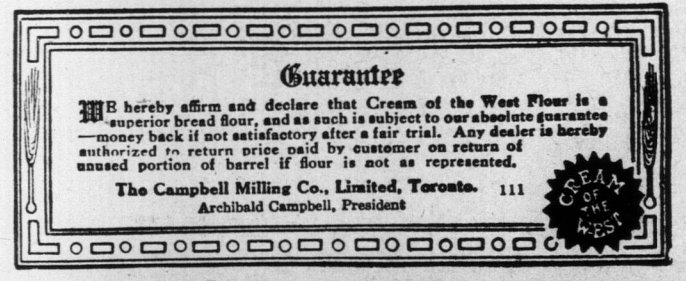

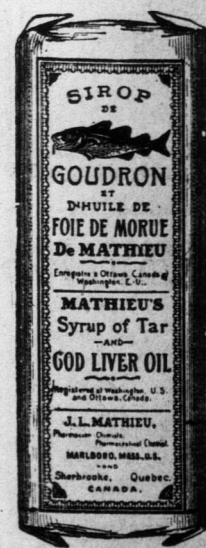
Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Nov. 8.
A wild rush of demoralized and hungry mobs of soldiers into the doomed city of Constantinople, and greatly to the general terror. Many Turks have crossed the Bosphorus, and many Europeans are seeking refuge aboard steamships. The Sultan's yacht is waiting in readiness to take him to Brusa in Asia Minor, and the Imperial Treasury has already been sent away. Twenty warships of the Powers will place before the Balkan States today the fact that Turkey has applied for mediation, but it is believed that the Allies will insist on

little change in the framework of Europe, but considerable extension of Austria-Hungary would be a great alteration. The Daily News states that public opinion here will insist on Serbia getting an open way to the sea. The Chronicle observes that Austro-Hungary might purchase Italian support by offering Italy an autonomous Albania, under an Italian prince, and herself re-assert her claims to the Sanjak and Saloniki. It would be a disgraceful bargain. The Daily Graphic considers that it would constitute an ineffaceable stain on the reputation of the Balkan States if they should despoil and partition Albania.

Special Evening Telegram.
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 8.
The Russian government has decided to retain time-expired soldiers in the Russian Army on active service until next spring. This places the Russian Army practically on a war footing; as the order affects several hundred thousand men, whose places would, in ordinary course, have been taken by the same number of recruits, who have just been called up. It is announced that the government have taken this step as the best means of preventing war; and it is thought that this can only mean that the Government foresees the possibilities of complications arising from the Balkan situation. The detention of these time-expired men will entail a cost of many millions.

Special Evening Telegram.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 8.
Fugitive Turkish forces are reported to have massacred many inhabitants of the village of Silivri on the coast of the Sea of Marmora, south west of Tchalalja. Forces of fleeing soldiers, who were in a state of semi-starvation, and utterly demoralized, are said to have set fire to all the houses in the village. A disease resembling cholera has broken out among the wounded Turkish soldiers arriving in Constantinople.

About 6.15 last evening a fierce fight occurred near Devon Row, on Duckworth Street, and in which three men were engaged. Quite a number of people who were going home from work gathered round. Some of them interfered and separated the fight before the police arrived. One of the contestants in the row named Sheehan was badly served from being pumelled and kicked by his aggressors.

FISH AFLOAT.—Since the advent of the damp atmosphere the past few days very little outdoor fish handling, such as culling, etc., has been done on the different mercantile premises along the waterfront. At present there are approximately 12,000 quintals of fish afloat in the harbor. Over thirty sail of craft have arrived from the various outports since the beginning of the week and they are awaiting for fine weather to haul in and dispose of their cargoes.
