SAILORS' AND SOLDIERS' CLUB.

Yesterday afternoon this Club was opened, and the rooms handed over to representatives of the Services, in a pleasing ceremony, of which we give a full account elsewhere. We are asked to state that the furniture and fixtures of the rooms have been made locally by the following firms: The Pope Furniture Company, 129 arm chairs and stools; Callahan and Glass, reading table, round tables, screens and refreshment counter; Howlett and Armstrong, tables for games, writing-desks and fixtures. The whole of this work has been carried out in mission style, and the excellence of the workmanship reflects much credit upon the firms mentioned. We do not need to be told that the Club is the result of the Ladies' enterprise; the appearance of the rooms is undeniable evidence of feminine taste. The furniture, admirably chosen for its purpose, is so arranged that every available inch of space is utilized without any suggestion of overcrowding. A large double reading and writing table runs down the middle of the room, while round tables and comfortable chairs are placed around the sides. At the western end the refreshment bar is screened off from the rest of the room. The prevailing color is dark green, and the whole effect is a very pleasant one which must be seen to be appreciated. Everything that could be foreseen for their comfort and convenience of the men has been provided, and in a most tasteful manner. We compliment the Ladies' Committee, and congratulate the men on their new acquisition.

The Dust Nuisance.

This subject recurs as a source of discussion regularly each year with the advent of summer and dry weather. Yesterday we published a timely letter which made particular reference to the Waterford Bridge Road, the direct thoroughfare from the city to Bowring Park. Having ourselves frequently traversed it of late, we can vouch for the truth of "Anti-Dust's" remarks. It is not often necessary to draw attention to the state of our country roads in this respect, that of the city streets providing in any case quite sufficient matter for comment, but this road is an exception. It leads to our principal and most valued recreation ground; it is much frequented on holidays and Sundays; and, most of all, it is easily the worst offender we have seen. We do not make these observations in a spirit of captious criticism, for we appreciate the difficulties of dealing adequately with the problem. Moreover, we know that in this instance the nature of the road itself is largely to blame. Its structure is very faulty. In many cases it slopes with the declivity along which it runs, and for a great part of its length it stands between deep ditches falling away on either side. Roads of this sort are invariably muddy. The traffic over them is compelled to follow a narrow track which quickly becomes worn and full of ruts; or this the autumn gives abundant, we might say liquid, evidence. So that this particular thoroughfare will need structural alteration before it can be properly freed of dust. But there are many other roads, well built, where the nuisance is almost as much in evidence. We do not presume to be an authority on the question but of this we are certain—**water does not lay dust.** The most it does is to convert it temporarily into surface mud. Oil does lay dust, and lays it very effectively. We are sorry that the introduction of oil-carts some time ago was not followed up by the installation of a regular, universal system. St. John's Municipal Election.

QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS.

A voter must be a male British subject of the age of 21 years and upwards. He must have resided for one year next preceding the election within the limits of the town of St. John's as defined in the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902. Being qualified as above, he may vote if he—
(1) Has occupied a dwelling house within the above limit for the above period; or if he
(2) Has been liable to and actually paid rates or assessments to the St. John's Municipal Council as (a) Ground landlord, or (b) Owner, lessee or occupier of any lands, tenements, buildings or any interest therein, or
(c) Any other taxes under the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902, or any former Act relating to the Municipal affairs of St. John's.

The mere fact of the purchase of Coal upon which a revenue has been paid to the Customs does not in itself qualify the purchaser to vote.

Musketry Notes.

On Monday, the 19th inst., the volunteers were engaged in practice under the General Musketry Course, part of one, Nos. 1, 2 and 3. At 100 yards, grouping practice, the following men made possibles, placing five shots each within a four inch circle: Corpl. H. Roman; Ptes. A. Moore, A. J. Lamer, M. Gallant, H. T. Granter, J. B. Grant, J. J. Kelly, J. Woodman. This is a very good showing, as the men used for the first time the new Short Lee-Enfield Rifle, Mark IV, and were shooting with fixed bayonets under quite new conditions. Pte. H. T. Granter placed all of his five shots within a two inch circle at 100 yards. The other men placed their shots within an 8 inch circle. At application practice, 200 yards, 2nd class target, some good scores were also made, the possible being twenty points. Pte. A. Moore made 18 points and Pte. R. Johnson 18. This practice was also carried out with fixed bayonets. The good results obtained under strange conditions speak well for the training the men have received from our local instructors, and reflect much credit on Sergt. Byrne, who has been working hard to get the new system of training in shape.

Workman Fell Into Steamer's Hold.

At 11 o'clock last night Patrick Carroll, aged 59, a workman engaged on the s.s. Durlay Chine, which is discharging general cargo at the Furness Wharf pier, accidentally fell into the aft hold of that ship. He was standing on the gangway and in reaching for a sling of sacks that was hoisted out of the hold, lost his balance and fell through the open hatchway, landing on barrels and sacks about 18 feet below. As a result a bone near the ankle was fractured and the wonder is that he escaped so well. He was attended by Dr. Cowperthwaite and later conveyed to the General Hospital in the ambulance for treatment.

Sentenced to 9 Months Imprisonment.

A seaman named Cunningham, who is of unusual physique and who is notorious for assaulting the police, ran amuck at the home of his aunt last night. He was arrested under warrant by Detective Tobin and this morning was made answer to the following charges before Judge Hutchings: (1) for drunk and disorderly conduct, (2) for assaulting Mary Randall and (3) for maliciously destroying 2 mirrors, a stove, a picture, and several other articles, valued at \$100. He was convicted on each charge and fined \$25 or 2 months; it was also ordered that at the expiration of the six months' term, he give heavy bonds for his future good behaviour, or go to jail for an additional three months, an aggregate sentence of nine months' imprisonment in H. M. Penitentiary.
