The 41st Battalion of the First Newfoundland Regiment Church Lads Brigade paraded at 8 o'clock Thursday evening as usual with Lieut.-Col. R. F. Goodridge Officer Commanding and the following officers on duty: Capt. H. A. Outerbridge, M. B. E., Avalon Goodridge, C. Wearing Hayward, Quartermaster Williams, Lieuts. Harold Hayward, Phil B. Rendell, W. R. Mott, and Lance Hayward as well as Regt. Sergt. Major Rowland Williams. The full brass band was present, under Lieut. Morris and the artistes, were busy practising hard for their Easter Monday Concert in the Methodist College Hall. Amongst the new items on their programme will be "The Overture 'Rosamunde'" a selection from William Tell and the Schubert march "Militaire". Bandmaster Morris hopes to have an ideal programme. Orders for next week include 2nd Lieut. Hayward as Orderly Officer, with Rev. Lieut. Fletcher as next for duty and Capt. A. Clayton, C.F., as duty Chaplain. After drill the lads played hockey. No. 1 section A and No. 4 section A Company, competed in a scratch match, and resulted in 2 goals to nil. Sergt. Major H. Rendell was referee. Bandsman Potties has made a splendid addition to the War Shrine in order to contain all the brass plates containing the names of Ex-members who have fallen: "Our heroic dead." The Shrine has had a small set of doors added of British teak wood which exactly matches that in the original wood from the Naval training ship Britannia, whilst the new wood is from the timbers of Messrs. Goodridge and Sons vessel "Clementine" of the Mercantile Mar-

ine—thus both sea services have contributed their mites to the shrine, which contains 130 brass plates with a name on each of a member that has made the Supreme Sacrifice. During the evening the Brigade were honoured with a visit from Hon. S. Bell and F. B. Woodman, Esq., of Charlottetown, P.E.I., who were shown through the various departments by Major Williams. Both gentlemen expressed themselves as being delighted with the work the Brigade is doing. A meeting of the W.O. and N.C.O. Mess was held last night and decided to hold their monthly dance on Monday, April 26th. The music will be provided by the full Band of the Battalion.

The annual mess dinner of the W.O. and N.C.O. Mess will be held in the Armoury on April 22nd, the Battalion cooks will have charge of the menu, so that everybody will have complete satisfaction and no grouching. The Brigade loses the services of Captain C. Waring Hayward next week. He has been training a squad of recruits all winter in the Armoury and has been a great help to the Colonel Commanding. Capt. Hayward, some 25 years ago, was one of the original officers that founded the Brigade in the Colony, and is delighted to see it still flourishing. He leaves next week to take up his survey work for the Canadian Government in British Columbia, and all ranks hope to see him back at Headquarters next winter. In the meantime we wish him good luck and a safe return.
