## Washington Honours Her President's Remains.

### German Chancellor Declares French Procedure in Ruhr Makes Negotiations Impossible--Youth Shoots His Sweetheart--Insulin Treatment Obtainable by All.

#### IMPRESSIVE ARRIVAL OF FUNERAL TRAIN AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. President Harding's funeral train reached Washington at 10.22 last night. Thousands jammed the station and approaches; the concourse waiting for hours the arrival. The train backed into the station so that the funeral car, with its flag draped casket came in first. The lights in the car cast a brilliant glow in the train shed as Mrs. Harding stepped off the car, leaning on Secretary Christian's arm and with Dr. Sawyer on her other side. The band in the concourse played "Nearer My God To Thee," as the casket was lifted from the special door cut in the side of the car and placed on a rolling platform. Mrs. Harding reached the White House at 10.45 p.m. just as her husband's body was being taken into the President's room. At the station it was borne through the long room and to the plaza beyond and lifted to the black draped gun car, then with military escort, and followed by a long cortege, including President Coolidge, Chief Justice Taft, Secretary Hughes and members of the Cabinet, the body was taken to the White House and was carried in its casket tenderly into the East room with its endless bank of flowers from the kings and great ones of the world.

#### THOUSANDS PAY TRIBUTE TO THEIR DEAD PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9. A swelling tide of honours bore Warren Harding to-day back over the road by which he came triumphant to the Presidency two crowded years ago. Among tens of thousands of his silent countrymen grouped along the way he passed in such state as only the great dead of the nation is accorded. He was carried to-day down the wide avenue with marching legions tramping ahead to lay him under the Dome of Capitol for a brief space before his native state received the mortal remains of her most distinguished son. General Pershing rode ahead of the cortege that passed down the silent crowded street from the White House to the Capitol, while behind him and preceding the carriage marched thousands of military, their bayonets glittering in a warm sun. Following was President Coolidge, grieving that high office came at such sorrowful cost and with him the only living man who before had held that office, one so crippled in illness that he might not give himself as he would to the sorrowful duty of the day. Woodrow Wilson and William H. Taft. The flag draped casket was laid open beneath the Dome where thousands passed in silent procession throughout the day to bid their last farewell to the much loved President, so soon to leave Washington forever.

#### FRENCH PROCEDURE SAYS CHANCELLOR CUNO TO PEACE.

BERLIN, Aug. 9. French procedure in the Ruhr and Rhineland makes negotiations with the French wholly impossible, Chancellor Cuno told the Reichstag this afternoon in the course of his promised review of the internal and foreign situation. Referring to the present stage of the Anglo-French conversations, he said "In her endeavour to continue cordial relations with her former comrades in arms, England undoubtedly made concessions to France, and while it is not for us to pass judgment on them, we at the same time believe ourselves free of the folly of expecting sympathies in quarters where we know they are not present." If current purporters among the entente nations are not productive of tangible results Germany will be wholly reconciled, said the Chancellor, to the realization that she is dependent upon herself and that her battle will be fought in spirit of self-reliance.

#### BATTLE BETWEEN POLICE AND RELIGIOUS FANATICS IN PHILIPPINE ISLAND.

MANILA, Aug. 9. Details of a battle between a detachment of Philippine Constabulary and Moro Religious Fanatics, which began last Saturday in Lanao District, Island of Mindanao, resulting in the killing of forty-six maddened natives and wounding of three constables came to Governor Wood by telegraph to-day. A band of crazed Moros have been causing trouble for some time and the Commander of the troops in that district decided delay in cleaning out the danger zone would mean greater loss of life and a body of Constabulary set out into the wild country to wipe out the band. Thirteen natives deserted the band, thirty-six were killed and twenty were reported to be still holding out in their mountain fastnesses but would be captured or killed.

#### INQUIRY INTO LOSS C.P.R. LINER MARVALE.

LONDON, Aug. 9. Official inquiry into loss of the Canadian Pacific liner Marvale off the Southern Coast of Newfoundland, May the twentieth, without loss of life, was opened in London to-day. Butler Aspinall, K.C. representing the Board of Trade described the circumstances of the wreck. Capt. Lewis of the Marvale dwelt on the unfavorable conditions and attributed the stranding to unusual atmospheric conditions and abnormal current which was nearer the coast than had been anticipated. The captain said he had been in command of sixteen ships since 1914 and this was his first casualty. The enquiry was adjourned.

#### YOUNG GIRL MURDERED IN PRESENCE OF PARENTS.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 9. Erle Johnson, a seventeen year old Hamilton girl was shot and killed on the steps of her home before the eyes of her parents, brothers and sisters, at eleven-thirty last night by her sweetheart, George King, age twenty-five, who was arrested here four hours later. King said good night to his sweetheart then called her to his side saying he wished to give her a letter to post for him. The letter was addressed to his mother and immediately the girl took it from him. He drew a heavy revolver and shot her through the chest. She died a few minutes later. King wanted to marry Miss Johnson, but her parents objected because of her youth. Immediately after the shooting King dashed down the street and jumped into a passing motor car. Pressing the revolver against the driver's side and forced him to drive all the way to Toronto, where the murderer, who readily talked of his need and expressed regret, gave himself up to the police. He said he had planned to suicide before the police came, but delayed too long.

MONTREAL, Aug. 9. James A. Flaherty of Philadelphia, was unanimously re-elected Supreme Knight, Knights of Columbus, at the forty-first Convention here to-day.

#### GRAND LODGE ODDFELLOWS ELECTS ITS OFFICERS.

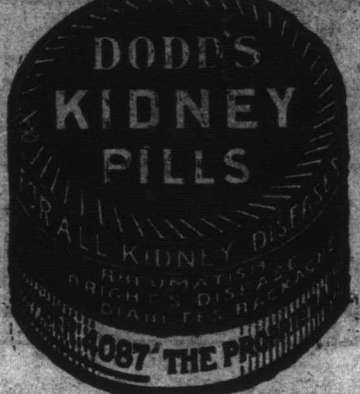

#### RUSSIA CANCELS APPOINTMENT OF DELEGATE CHRISTIAN RAKOVSKY.

LONDON, Aug. 9. Russia has officially notified Great Britain that the appointment of Christian Rakovsky as head of the Russian Delegation to London will be cancelled in deference to Great Britain's objection. According to the Daily Express, Great Britain objected to certain published utterances of Rakovsky and to passages aimed against England in a book published by him.

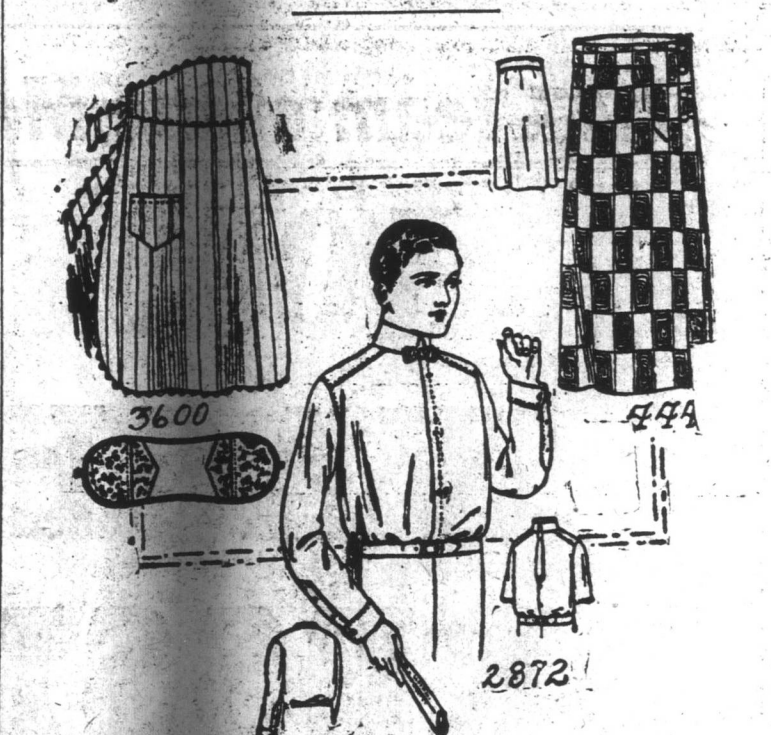
