NINE-FOOT CHANNEL PLAN WINN-ING WIDER SENATORIAL SUPPORT.

Washington, Nov. 22.-The movement for development of the inland waterways is not only showing great strength as members of Congress assemble for the opening of the session but it is beginning to take more definite form.

A committee of Senators has been conducting hearings from the Great Lakes along the Mississippi to the channel from lakes to gulf. This has resulted not only in helping along the cause of the nine-foot channel but also the general proposition of improgramme carried out. On Sunday, Sydney.
