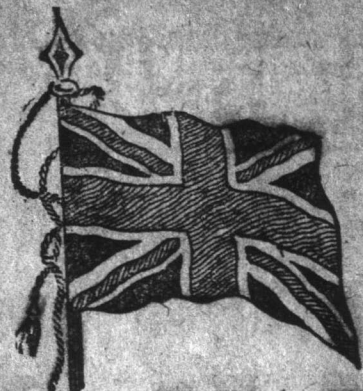

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

AMERICAN BRIDE FOR DANISH PRINCE.

NEW YORK, June 10. Miss Eleanor Margaret Green today became the bride of Prince Dag, Christian Adolphus George, of the House of Schleswig-Holstein. The wedding took place at the Royal Palace in Copenhagen. The Princess is the daughter of the late Dr. and Mrs. Jas. O. Green. Her marriage, which was performed by Bishop Manning, in Calvary Church, is unique among international marriages in involving women born on the American Continent. With one exception the record shows several marriages of heiresses to Princes of Royal Houses but none to members of a reigning house except the marriage last February of Miss Lois F. Booth, of Ottawa, to Prince Viggo, the older brother of Prince Erik.

RESIGNATION OF MILLERAND TO-DAY.

PARIS, June 10. Alexandre Millerand, the eleventh President of France, will resign from office Wednesday. His resignation will be read before both Houses of Parliament and his successor will be selected by the Chamber of Deputies and Senate meeting as a National Assembly at Versailles, Friday. The President's determination to resign came after the reading on Tuesday in the two Houses of President's message presented by the new Premier, Frederic Francois Marsal, in which M. Millerand declined to resign, and an adverse vote against the Ministry by both Chamber and Senate, and finally the adoption of a motion offered in the Chamber by Edouard Herriot, leader of the Radical Socialists, which in effect eliminated any Government favorable to or suggested by M. Millerand. The resolution was "The Chamber is resolved not to enter into relations with a Ministry which in its composition is a negation of the rights of Parliament. It refuses to accept a constitutional debate to which it is invited and decides to postpone all discussion until the day when a Government constituted in conformity with the sovereign will of the country appears before it." The motion was passed in the House 329 to 214.

AIRMEN'S DIFFICULTIES ADJUSTED.

PIST, Italy, June 10. The difference between Lieut. Locatelli, the Italian aviator, and Ronald Amundsen, the explorer, have been adjusted. Lieut. Locatelli's difficulties with Mr. Amundsen had to do with the claim to be flown on the exploring airplane. The pilot said that Mr. Amundsen insisted that all of the planes fly only the Norwegian colours. Lieut. Locatelli wanted to carry the Italian flag.

PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN OPENS.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 11. The formal campaign for the election of Calvin Coolidge to succeed himself in the White House slid off the political ways here to-day when the 1924 Republican National Convention met, heard the keynote address of its temporary chairman, did a little necessary routine business, and adjourned to reconvene to-morrow. Probably more than 12,000 persons witnessed the opening session, and while countless hundreds of thousands more heard what was said by radio.

Celebrates Golden Jubilee

Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Sterling, who to-day celebrate the golden jubilee of their marriage. A half century ago, Miss Mary J. Gaden, daughter of the late Garland C. Gaden, Sheriff of the Northern District and W. R. Sterling Church before the altar at St. Thomas' Church and were united in the holy bonds of matrimony. The officiating clergyman were Rev. Thos. M. Wood, Rev. G. M. Johnson and Rev. A. C. F. Wood. The Telegram joins with a host of friends in wishing Mr. and Mrs. Sterling many years in which to enjoy the autumn of their life's summer.

The Hudson Bay Railway

Ten years ago not a bushel of grain passed through the port of Vancouver. This year 50,000,000 bushels, or practically the whole of the exportable surplus of Alberta, was shipped to Europe that way—and next year the amount will be increased. It is possible, that in the face of such a development, with all the crops of Alberta and a portion of the crop of Saskatchewan destined to go via the Pacific Coast, with Canada all but committed to the St. Lawrence Waterways scheme, and with out-transcendental railways still in vast difficulties, this country, head over heels in debt, and suffering from a weight of taxation, is going to throw \$30,000,000 more of good money after \$35,000,000 of bad money to build a new railway through an uncolonized country to a port where the chief product is ice and the majority of the inhabitants wolves?—Ottawa Press Journal.
