MORE TROUBLE IN TURKEY GOVERNMENT SENDS TROOPS Albanian Risings in Those Parts Have Become Serious

Constantinople, April 27 .- The Albanian risings have again become serious and the government has decided to dispatch two brigades of reinforcements, equal to sixteen full battalions, to the affected districts from Smyrna and Salonika. Later reports say several thousand Albanians attacked eight Turkish battalions near Shtimiya Northern Albania, and successfully prevented the Turkish occupation of Dulya Pass.
