### MEXICAN REBELS CUT OFF AMERICANS AT CANANEA

Naco, Ariz, Sept. 10.—Mexican rebels today cut all traffic and communication between here and Cananea, So nora, Mexico, where about 500 Americans reside. Shortly afterward a passenger train arrived here carrying 500 rifles and 150,000 rounds of ammunition sent by the United States government from the arsenal at Fort Sam Huston, from the arsenal at Fort San Huston, San Antonia, Texas, to arm the American residents in Cananea. The rebels cut the railway in an attempt to prevent the shipment of a ms reaching the Americans at Cananea.

# SAN LAZARO, HAVANA, IS A

Behind the leper hospital in the San Lazaro district of the city of Havana there lies an old cemetery. Few of the many visitors to that city w that there is such a place; still fewer even pass beneath its vine-cov-ered portal. Thousands visit the Colon cemetery, with its massive gateway nd its beautiful monuments; not in a thousand sees that eigh of the read which was established by Bishop Jean de Espado in 1805. For twentyfive years it has stood unused

in old Roman days, in the time the funeral pyre, it was customary t gather the ashes of the incinerated dead and place them in funeral urns.
These were seeled and deposited, in niches in the walls of special buildings or enclosures, its which was applied the mame of columbaria, for the reason that their appearance suggested a dove-cote. The general idea of the columbaria has been preserved and, though unusual, is far from unique. with the burning and deposits the coffined body in niches only differing from those of the Roman days essentially in their size. This is the system of the Espada cemetery in Havana.

The opening of a strongly locked and heavily barred iron gateway gives passage into a high-walled en of some three or four acres in exter Neither monument nor standing tomb-stone breaks its flat and grassy area A grass-grown pathway leads straight across the plot to the mortuary chapel upon its northern side. All around are the walls, four to five yards in height, showing four tiers of round-topped niches, some open and some closed and sealed. Midway the western wall a gateway opens upon a sec-ond enclosure of similar area to the first, though of different arrangement. A brick paved walkway crosses it from east to west, bisecting a series of in-terior walls which extends through its greater length.

There are six of these structures, alternately open and arching the path-way. Here, too, the surrounding walls and the interior structures show the four rows of niches. A little counting and a rough calculation gave the total number in both enclosures at about 12,000.

The ground immediately around the chapel, in the outer yard, is largely occupied by the horizontal slabs which

mark the resting place of these who rank, wealth or influence has secured for them a special interment. Many of the stones are broken, all are weather-stained, bordered with untrimmed grass and weeds. For the graves of many who lie here there is no one to care. Many of the wall niches stand empty by reason of an established custom, prevalent in these countries of renting burial space for a time only At the expiration of that time the bones are removed to a large uncover ed receptacle along the southern wall, where they constitute a ghastly heap, seen only from the top of the wall.
