

## Late Gossip —of the— Round World.

The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company has presented \$50 to one of its brakemen as a slight token in recognition of the fact that he "used his brains" in a recent emergency, thereby averting a wreck.

A pet monkey, untimely deceased, had a very formal burial in a satin-lined white casket in Baltimore one day last week. There were six pall-bearers, a eulogistic address, four carriages for the mourners and several floral designs, including an "empty chair" and a "gates ajar."

Frank Winn, of Worcester, Mass., has invented a typewriter that prints music, the lines of the staff notes and all, and makes as clear a copy as if it came from a lithographic stone. The machine is like a typewriter in appearance. It has forty-four keys, thirty-five for notes and nine for the Arabic numerals.

It has been decided by the Bath corporation to place a tablet upon the house in St. James' square in which Dickens was wont to reside on the occasion of his visits to the old city whither Pickwick retired after the memorable trial. As it was while staying at this house that the novelist created Little Nell, the tablet is particularly appropriate.

Marconi has invented an instrument for ascertaining a ship's position in a fog when it is within range of one of his telegraph stations. It consists of a receiver which can be revolved and which when pointing toward the transmitting station sets off an electric bell, thus establishing the bearings as accurately as the compass can. The instrument is to be tried on the channel steamers.

Diagrams prepared by an expert for one of the large life insurance companies to illustrate the comparative longevity of clergymen, farmers, teachers, lawyers and doctors show that 42 out of every 170 ministers of the gospel reach the age of 70. The farmers come next, their proportion for 70 years of age being 40 out of 170. Next come the teachers, with 34; the lawyers show 25; the doctors are last, with only 24 out of 170.

The funds invested so far in the Paris Exposition amount to \$7,600,000. Of this sum, \$5,600,000 has been paid away during the present year. The Paris municipality has contributed \$2,400,000 of the \$4,000,000 promised by the city and \$500,000 has been supplied by the Western, of France, railway, and other various undertakings. The state has contributed \$1,300,000 and has agreed to pay it \$1,400,000 more before the end of 1899.

The manufacture of water gas is to be discontinued in Boston within a few months and coal gas will be substituted. There has been a steady increase in the city in the last six years in the number of deaths, accidental and suicidal, from the water gas, and it is believed by the health authorities that for each death caused by this means there are 10 persons suffering more or less from the same gas issuing from defective pipes and fixtures.

The Boston Pilot tells of an exhorter who was holding forth on the Common and solemnly presented to his hearers the alternative of "salvation or damnation—the King James Bible or the Douay Bible." Among the audience was a citizen who had been imbibing somewhat freely. This gentleman apparently misunderstood the preacher, for he yelled: "Hooray for the Dewey Bible!" the crowd took up the cry, and the exhorter was compelled to suspend further effort.

Mentz is to have an important celebration next year. It is to be the quinquenary of the birth of John Gutenberg, the inventor of printing with movable types, who was born in or near that city. The imperial chancellor has lent his name to the movement and it is intended that the memorial ceremonies shall be on a grand scale. It is a very odd fact, considering the career of the man whose memory is to be celebrated, that the committee of management does not include any member of the press.

Massachusetts has paid out \$20,000 for the sole purpose of getting rid of a certain family of moths! The "gypsy" moth is the very destructive insect which the state board seeks to drive out. The little creatures have proved such a pest that it has been found necessary to employ hundreds of men to do nothing but destroy them. Indeed, the above sum is by no means all that will be required to accomplish the work, for it is estimated that fully ten times that amount must be spent before they are finally exterminated.

Rosa Bonheur just before her death put her foot down on a scheme of the woman agitators to make use of her fame for their own ends. The picture she sent to this year's salon was the first she had exhibited in many years. The "feminists" thereupon assailed the jury with demands that the "medal of honor" should be awarded to her because she was a woman. The artist

wrote a note to the jury forbidding the use of her name, "as it would be ridiculous that the insignificant picture I exhibit this year should receive so high an honor."

**The Largest Ships Afloat.**  
The Oceanic is easily first in the list with a gross register tonnage of 17,000, and her nearest rival is the German steamship Deutschland, 15,500 tons, followed by the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, 14,349 tons, and the Patricia, 13,000 tons, all flying the German flag. Next come in the Lucania and the Campania, of 12,952 and 12,950 tons respectively. The Germans again come in with the Pennsylvania, 12,891 tons; the Graf Waldersee, 12,830 tons, and the Pretoria, 12,800 tons register. The next largest boats are the Cymric, 12,552 tons; the Medo, 11,850, and the Afric, 11,816; whilst the Germans can place against them the Grosser Kurfurst, 12,500; the Kaiser Friedrich, 12,480, and the Belgia, 11,100 tons. Under the British flag there are only nine steamers of over 10,000 tons register, against nineteen similar German steamers. The Americans own four steamers of over 10,000 tons (the St. Louis and St. Paul, 11,629 tons each; the Paris, 10,669 and the New York, 10,674). No other nation possesses a single ship of over 10,000 tons register.

## WORN AT CHARTER HOUSE. How English Boys Dress at a Big Public School.

At all public schools there are rules laid down by the boys, and these are usually kept quite as strictly as those which are made by the masters, says the Pall Mall Gazette. Privileges are gained by length of time at school or skill in games, etc. At Charterhouse every boy is obliged to wear a black coat and waistcoat and tie, so at the beginning or end of the "quarter," as the term is called, or when anybody goes out of bounds by train or any other way, he who has been a year at the school is allowed to wear a "sporting" coat and tie (that is, not the ordinary black clothes), and he is also allowed to carry a walking stick, and at any time to wear a flower in his buttonhole, and to keep his coat outside his collar, and affect "stick-ups," if he is in the Upper School.

Fellows in the sixth form, writes a Charterhouse boy in the Captain, may wear white ties on Sundays instead of black, and all fellows who are considered to be "men" or bloods, as they are called—are allowed to wear tall coats on Sundays and to wear black hat ribbons instead of their house colors.

Another old custom is to wear your house cap with the peak at the back instead of at the front, and if any one disobeys this rule he is promptly told to "take it off," or not to "advertise," or swagger. At football, which is the real game at Charterhouse, the first eleven wear dark blue knickers, usually called "cuts"; the second, third and fourth elevens may wear white, and fellows who play for their house or have been two years at the school may wear gray "cuts," but those who have not been two years in their house wear gray "bags," buckling below the knee. Fellows who have not been a year in their house may not occupy a chair, and at supper only those who play for their house may sit down in their flannels.

**To Wash Cotton Goods.**  
French satens may be cleaned by putting them in a lather of luke-warm soapsuds, in which dissolve a cupful of salt. Put salt also in the rinsing water. Dip the article in thin starch and roll up in a clean sheet, and in two hours iron on the wrong side. For washing blue or mauve gingham add a tablespoonful of washing soda to a gallon of cold rinsing water; this will bring out the colors, while a teaspoonful of vinegar to a gallon of water will improve pink or green prints. For black or navy blue wash in hot water containing a cupful of salt, rinse in very blue water and dry in the shade; then dip in very blue, thin starch, and when nearly dry iron on the wrong side with a moderately warm iron.
