Interesting Items of Happenings in the Western Peninsula.

Rov. E. J. Haines has resigned the pastorate of Wyoming Baptist church. Tilbury's water supply for May just cost the town the paltry sum of \$22.29.

F. W. Broadfoot, B. A., of Guelph, went to camp at London with the field battery of that city. He was taken ill there and hurried to his home, where he died next day. Mr. Broadfoot was a student at Knox College and would have graduated next year.

Advices received from our con respondents since the date of the last report, May 7th, show tha favorable conditions for fruits o all kinds continue, on the whol most excellent. Early fruit suffere

in some districts from late frosts Apples—The bloom, on the whole was very heavy. The period of setting was not yet over when most of the reports were received from the Maritime Provinces, but every indication points to a medium to full crop except for early varieties, which do not promise more than a light crop. The prospects are for a medium to full crop in most sections of Ontario.

Pears-Indications point to a fu crop.
Plums—There are excellent pro

pects for plums in almost every section.

Peaches—Allowing for the winter killing of 1899 and 1903 the prospects for peaches are very promis-

Other Fruits-Indications are that cherries and bush fruits will be an abundant crop in nearly every district. Some losses occurred to the strawberry crop from the late frosts.

Foreign Countries-Late advices from England report that the apple orop there will be a short one.

WRECK COST \$771,000.

Chicago, June 30 .- The wreck of the Twentieth Century Limited on the Lake Shore cost \$771,000. This is the estimate made, following the disbursement by two life insurance companies of \$266,000 to heirs of the dead. Of this sum \$100,000 was paid on life policies and \$166,-000 on accident policies. There remains yet to be paid by life insurance companies for deaths in this wreck \$150,000. How much the railway company

affected by the wreck must pay is something of a question, but the figures among local companies figures among local companies shows that \$95,000 will be paid for nineteen deaths without litigation. Injury claims are estimated to represent at the present time without litigation \$200,000. The loss of the engine stands for \$25,000 and of the library car \$10,000. To these figures is to be added for incidental losses not enumerated, such as delay of trains, track repairs, investigation expenses, etc., \$25,000.

The total of this is \$355,000 which, added to what the insurance companies have disbursed, makes \$771,

For the past few years it has been the practice for an outfit of ringers, many of them cheap skates at that, to follow the fairs, take down the money and divide it to suit them-selves. This class of racing is a detriment to a fair, and should not be encouraged. Where the speeding is between local horses, the rivalry is keener, and free from
