**THE WEATHER PROPHECY.**  
TORONTO, Nov. 11-12 a.m.—To-night an  
area of high pressure extends from Northern  
Canada southward over the Atlantic States,  
and another covers the Northwestern and  
Western States, while between the two is an  
area of low pressure extending from the  
Upper Mississippi Valley and the South-  
western States generally fine and mild. Moderate  
winds have prevailed on the lakes. Min-  
imum and maximum temperatures: Calgary,  
23-46; Prince Albert, 20-42; Qu'Appelle,  
28-40; Winnipeg, 23-46; Toronto, 16-50;  
Montreal, 40-48; Quebec, 31-40; Halifax, 32-52.

—The annual ball of the London Hunt  
will take place on Friday, Nov. 28.  
—Despite the drizzle quite a large num-  
ber of strangers were in the city to-day.

—The weather did not prevent a good  
attendance at Covent Garden market to-day.  
—A party of seven left London last even-  
ing via C. P. R. for Vancouver, by the  
tourist car from Toronto.

—With the fine weather that has been  
enjoyed for several days the foggy drear-  
iness of to-day contrasted remarkably.  
—Mr. John Lewis became owner of the  
Kincaid property, on Richmond street,  
yesterday. The consideration was \$5,850.

—The Ball Committee of the London  
Hunt have engaged the services of Corlett's  
famous orchestra, of Toronto, for Nov. 28.  
—Bishop O'Connor will visit Wyoming  
and Petroia to-morrow. The recently  
purchased church bells will be consecrated.

—Mrs. Tilley, of this city, is announced

Wednesday evening next.

Hunter is mother-in-law of Mr. Ed. Clark,

—Mr. Thomas Brown, secretary of the  
Western Fair, was busy yesterday after-  
noon dispatching the medals won by ex-  
hibitors at the last exhibition. They are  
beautiful specimens of workmanship.

—W. Y. Brunton & Son sold the follow-  
ing bankrupt stock yesterday: Roseburg

Mr. Beckie, at 72 cents on the dollar;—

shings at 38 cents to the last buyer.

—Mr. Thomas Finlay and family left on  
Wednesday morning for London. Their  
host of friends here will regret the removal.  
Mr. Finlay has not had very good health  
for some time. He is gaining strength now,  
and we hope to soon hear of him being  
robust and strong. (Kincaid Recorder.)

—Speaking of Rev. R. Aylward, who has  
been called to the pastorate of the First  
Congregational Church in this city, the  
Cobourg Sentinel says: "The reverend  
gentleman's many friends in Cobourg will  
regret his departure, as during his stay  
here both he and his estimable wife have  
won the regard of all."

—Rev. Dr. Carman, general superinten-  
dent, and Rev. Dr. Griffin, Guelph, leave  
on Monday for Philadelphia to attend a  
meeting to make arrangements for the  
Ecumenical Council of the Methodists of  
the world to assemble in New York in  
October, 1891. The Council is the first  
held since the gathering in London in 1881.

—Licenses having been issued this year,

Chief) in the place of the late P. C. Larkin.

**The Revival in Strathroy.**  
—A correspondent writes: The spiritual  
life of Front Street Methodist Church con-  
gregation was at a very low ebb when the  
Misses Dimsdale arrived to take charge of  
special services for a month. During their  
stay they took entire control of the work,  
both in the preaching and in the conducting  
of the prayer meetings. Their sermons  
were models of plain, practical, earn-  
est Gospel teaching, presented in a  
winning manner. Large congregations  
spelt-bound, showing by their intense  
interest that people to-day are really hun-  
gering for simple and effective words.  
Under the blessing of God, the mem-  
bership of the church has been wonderfully  
quickened into new life, and at the same  
time 162 persons have presented themselves  
as seekers of salvation. It was the earnest  
and united wish of the church that these  
laymen and godly sisters prolong their  
stay, but pressing engagements called them

wishes of scores of gladdened hearts, the  
earnest prayers of many a family made  
happy by their visit, and the united ben-  
edictions of a quickened church.

This afternoon Trinity Church was the  
scene of its interesting ceremony which  
united Mr. E. E. Ward, of the Malton  
Bank, London, and Miss Lillie Mitchell,  
daughter of the late Cornelius Mitchell, of  
this city. Both bride and groom are well  
known and popular in St. Thomas, and  
consequently the sacred edifice was filled  
with invited guests and interested specta-  
tors. The bride was supported by her  
cousins, the Misses Katie and Bertha  
Mason, of Toronto, the groomsmen being  
Mr. H. B. Travers, of this city. The cere-  
mony was performed by the rector of  
Trinity, Rev. Canon Hill, the brother-in-  
law of the bride, Mr. A. J. Clarke giving  
her away. Among those present was Mr.  
B. A. Mitchell, of London, uncle of the  
bride. Mrs. Ward held a reception at Mr.  
Clarke's residence, after returning from the  
church, and the happy couple will leave  
for eastern cities this afternoon. They  
will take up their residence in London on  
returning from their wedding journey.

Mrs. Ward has been prominent in musical  
circles in St. Thomas for some years, hav-  
ing taken the leading part on several oc-  
casions in the presentation of operettas by  
our local amateurs, and in these musical  
organizations, as well as in the wide circle  
of her personal friends, she will be greatly

**Hospital Trust.**  
Col. Lewis (chairman), Mayor Taylor,  
Trustees Complin, Gilmour, Medical Super-  
intendent Balfour and Secretary Graydon  
attended a meeting of the Hospital Trust  
yesterday. Mr. John Nicholson's indebted-  
ness to the hospital of \$27.20 was reduced  
to \$14.35 at the request of St. George's  
Masonic Lodge, of which he was a mem-  
ber. Mayor Taylor asked for a definition  
of the rule governing the appointment of  
nurses. A lady in the city wanted an ap-  
pointment, and he thought local people  
should have the preference. The matter was  
found by the bylaws to rest with the  
superintendent. The duties of the engi-  
neer were discussed and a motion passed  
requesting that he make himself generally  
useful, in addition to his work at the  
boilers, with the option of ending his en-  
gagement in two weeks should the resolution  
be accorded Mrs. T. H. Smallman, Mr.  
Mason, and Mrs. McCormick and the W. C.  
T. U. for their kind donations to the  
hospital. Mr. A. O. Graydon was em-  
powered to attend to a drain at the  
new boiler. Dr. Balfour's report  
showed 18 patients admitted and 15 dis-  
charged during the last month, leaving in  
the hospital 47 patients. The monthly ac-  
counts (\$914.45) were ordered to be paid.
