

Which Mr. Powell Will Build at Springbank.

He Wants Some Modifications in th Agreement-A Double Track.

Mr. Powell, the electric incline railway man, was again before the water commissioners yesterday afternoon. 'At the last meeting he agreed to build a fence around the reservoir, at a cost of \$3 per rod, but thought now that the price was too high, and that a fence could be built for \$1 25 per rod.

The mayor thought that the fence was the only guarantee that the commissioners had that the contract would be carried out. He suggested that Mr. Powell put up \$300 and let the city build the fence, and if the agreement was carried out, the money would be returned to him, he, of course, having to pay for his portion. If he would consent to this, the mayor also thought that an option could be given him at once for a stated time. He could then go on and organize his

Mr. Powell said he had several applications for shares in the company. It had been decided to locate the track on the west side of the path. where a survey had been made. The roadbed was to be 28 feet wide, with a double track, 16 feet wide. This would leave a margin of 12 feet.
