# GALES, MILD, RAIN.

Toronto, Nov. 20—11 p.m.—The pressure is highest over the Middle Atlantic States, and there is a storm developing over the Northwestern States. Snow has fallen today in eastern Nova Scotia and in Alberta elsewhere in the Dominion the weather has been fair.

# The Children's Aid Society.

There was a large gathering in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon to nominate officers for the Children's Aid Society. These names were suggested: President, J. R. Shuttleworth; Vice-President, J. R. Shuttleworth; Secretary, J. H. Judge; Treasurer, Mr. S. Gripp; Mr. J. H. Flock; Dr. Arnott; council, Messrs. C. Frazer, Darch, Murphy, Gregson, Hyman, Hutchinson, Jones, S. Crawford, Dr. Fowler, T. Macbeth, and Messrs. Harrison, W. J. Inglethorpe, Dr. Niven, F. Matthews, Hunterford, Dr. Hutchinson, J. W. Jones. Next Monday the election will take place.

Louis Bernstein bought a house and lot on the corner of South and Clarence streets some time ago from a Mrs. Hunter. He made a bargain for the premises at \$1,200, and paid \$100 down. Being presumably of an improving disposition he built a bath-house on the rear of the lot, which cost him \$100. Tiring of this addition, he wanted to sell it, and secured a purchaser in the person of Mr. George James Carty. The latter, it will be remembered, once secured \$5,000 from the street railway company for injuries he had received. Not having the money, he had to sell the engine to a standstill. In the excitement the throttle was opened as full as possible. This resulted in a high rate of speed being attained, and the coal heaver, seeing the predicament into which he had got himself, jumped and let the engine go. It went on for an hour, an open switch was reached. The locomotive was derailed, plowing up the track for a considerable distance, finally turning over on its side. It now lies in this position, and the damage is so great that it will have to be sent to Montreal for repairs. It was fortunate, indeed, that the switch was open, otherwise the engine would have been crushed under the wheels of the train.

The Car Shops.

W. C. T. U. Cooking Lessons.  
One of the departments of W. C. T. U. work in this city is the industrial school. About 80 girls from 6 to 14 years of age meet every Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in Somerset Hall, where they are taught sewing, knitting and darning by a number of ladies of the union. Once a month they have a temperance lesson, and all the children belonging to the school are pledged. For some time past it was felt that lessons in plain cooking and cookery for the sick would be of great benefit to this purpose. In order to obtain funds for this purpose a very successful art loan exhibition was held in February last, and the upper flat of Somerset Hall was rented and fitted up with stove, sink and cooking utensils. On Saturday the first lesson was given to the children by a trained teacher who has been engaged. All girls over 10 years of age are admitted to the cooking class, and they appeared greatly interested while the teacher explained the method of boiling and frying potatoes, and frying lamb chops. Many of them took notes and readily answered the questions asked by the teacher in the review following the lesson. The lessons are free to the children of the industrial school, and it is hoped that much good may be done in this branch of work. In the course of a week or two the ladies hope to open evening classes for young women, for which tickets will be issued, ten for \$1. Any young woman wishing to attend these classes may leave their names with Mrs. Darch or at Anderson & Nelles' drug store. Proper notice of date of opening will be given through the advertising columns of the daily papers. The ladies take this opportunity to enlarge their sphere of usefulness. The programme for next Saturday's lesson will be "Tomato Soup and Gruel."

Betting on Mr. Hyman's Election.  
Argument on the appeal case of Trebilcock vs. Walsh was commenced in the Court of Appeal at Toronto on Monday. W. R. Kesteven, Q.C., for defendant, appealed from an order of the Divisional Court of Common Pleas Division, dismissing a motion by the defendant to set aside the judgment of Street, J. The trial judge, in favor of plaintiff in an action to recover from defendant the sum of \$500, which was deposited by the plaintiff with defendant, to hold as a stake upon a bet between the plaintiff and one Richards on the election of a member to represent the city of London in the Divisional House. The defendant paid over both the plaintiff's stake and Richards' to the latter, in whose favor the wager was decided. The court, however, held the election illegal and that the stake was recoverable after the plaintiff had demanded its return. The effect of R. C. S., chap. 159, sec. 9 (e), was discussed, and also the case Reg. vs. Dillon, 10 P. R. 223. Aylesworth, Q.C., for plaintiff, contended that the plaintiff, contra. Not finished.
