Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 21.-About two hours after the men went to work in mine No. 2 of the Bessemen Land and Improvement Company's coal mine at Belle Ellen, near Blocton, Bibb county, yesterday, fire was dis-covered far down in the main slope. About 100 men were employed in the mine. A panic followed among the workers and in the little town of Belle Ellen. Hundreds of men, women and children gathered at the main en erance of the smoking mine, while relieve the miners. More than 50 were gotten out from the various entrances without harm. Others were overcome by smoke and fell by the wayside. These the brave searchers found and agged out, while those waiting at e entrance restored life to their un conscious friends. 
