WAS TO BE KEPT A SECRET

Mary McFarlane Tells of Her Proposed Marriage to Joseph Sifton.

Was Going to Throw Martin Morden Overboard Without Warning.

Witness Believes That the Elder Sifton's Death Was Purely Accidental.

Edgar Morden Credited With Saying That Gerald Would Poison Witness—Nothing Startling Brought Out in the Cross-Examination.

At the opening of this morning's session of the Sifton preliminary examination, Mary McFarlane was recalled for cross-examination.

Mr. Meredith first took the witness. To him she gave her age as 22 in September next. Witness became acquainted with Martin Morden when she went to Gerald Sifton's two years ago. Martin was working there at the time. Witness was engaged to be married to Martin, and the engagement continued up to the present time. No date was fixed for the marriage, but a year hence was discussed. Witness commenced to keep company with Joseph Sifton about two months before the latter's death. During this time she did not tell Martin she was going to marry Sifton. She went to garden parties and picnics with Martin during the two months, and went to Port Stanley with him on May 24. Witness agreed to go to Toronto on an excursion with Martin some time this summer. Witness did not tell Martin she was going to marry Sifton. The agreement to marry Joseph Sifton was made out driving one Sunday afternoon. The marriage was to be kept a secret, but witness might tell her mother if she saw fit.

Witness told Joseph Sifton that she was in trouble the Thursday night before his death. She supposed he knew who was the cause of her trouble. On Saturday night witness told Edgar Morden that she was not in trouble, as she thought he had no business to know.

On Friday night, witness told Gerald there was something wrong, and that she was going to marry Joseph Sifton. Gerald said he hoped she would be happy. Witness meant to throw Martin overboard, and not give him any notice of her marriage to Joseph Sifton. Witness was engaged to another person for a year about five years ago. Witness was not marrying Joseph Sifton for his money. On Friday night, June 29, witness went with Joseph Sifton and told her mother of the intended marriage, and her mother objected.

Witness then repeated the evidence as to Morden's coming to Gerald's house on Friday night and finding Joseph Sifton and witness there. Joseph Sifton and witness were in the buggy; to their going to Morden's house for the night, and to their going to Joseph Sifton's house early on Saturday morning, and Gerald's coming to the house. When Walter came running to meet the crowd, witness said to Joseph Sifton, "Oh, Mary, the governor has fallen from the barn," and he said something about striking himself with the axe. Witness became excited when she heard the news. While waiting for the crowd to get to the barn and finding Sifton lying there, witness was overcome with emotion and wept freely. Witness had left Joseph's house and gone to Gerald's house because there were so many strangers at Joseph's house. She did not tell anything that day. Edgar Morden came to Gerald's that night and saw witness. He said: "This is a fearful shock to you." Edgar added that he had just heard of the occurrence, and could hardly believe it. Joseph, he said, had taken the evening given him, and had run right into it after being warned. Edgar asked if there was any fear of anyone coming home and finding him there. Edgar told witness he wished to see her and tell her something important. Witness said to him she did not know when he would be leaving there, but when she did she would go to her mother's or her sister's. Edgar said he did not see how witness could stay there under the circumstances, but witness said she could not take anything from the people. Edgar said they might be nice to her face, but he didn't know what they would do behind her back. Witness answered she was not afraid. Edgar told witness to keep quiet about his being there. Witness wondered if Walter Herbert would tell that Edgar had been there, and Edgar said he did not think so. Edgar said everything would come out all right, and he would see that it did.

On the following Saturday Edgar Morden came to Gerald's for tea, and on this occasion he advised witness not to say anything, no matter what came out. Witness next saw Edgar at Sunday school on the Sunday before Gerald's arrest. Edgar told witness about the new will, by which she would be independent of Gerald, and that Gerald wished the will destroyed. Edgar wanted witness to leave Gerald's house at once, as she was in danger, and he would then tell her further about the will. Witness did not believe she was in any danger. She had always believed Joseph Sifton's death due to accident, and still believes so. Witness never made any statement to Detective Murray, but made one to Crown Attorney Magee on the night of Gerald Sifton's arrest. Witness is not yet making any claim for her rights under the will. Witness had told Gerald that she didn't want to be bothered with Edgar Morden, because she didn't trust him.

Joseph Sifton had not trusted him, nor anyone else, as far as witness knew. There had been no attempt to keep witness away from anyone, except Gerald said she wasn't to go out alone or see Ed Morden, and this was only after he expressed desire that she be not bothered with Edgar. Witness did not hear from Edgar or Mrs. Morden, or Joseph Sifton anything about the will on the night of June 29 or the morning of the 30th. Witness did not hear of the will for nearly two weeks after Joseph Sifton's death. Witness did not hear it from Edgar till the Sunday before Gerald's arrest. On this Sunday, Edgar said Gerald would poison her, but witness said she was not afraid, as she had lived in Gerald's house two years and trusted him.

On the Saturday following Joseph Sifton's death, Edgar, James and Martin Morden were all at Gerald's. They came to see Gerald. It was shortly after this that witness told Edgar and his wife that she didn't wish to be annoyed by Edgar.

Going back to Friday, June 29, witness said Edgar did not speak of having any conversation with Gerald. What he spoke of was overhearing conversations which showed that Joseph Sifton was in danger. Joseph Sifton told witness that Edgar had said he heard the sum of \$5,000 mentioned in the conversation. During the time witness was in Edgar's house, Martin Morden was the only name mentioned in connection with the danger to Joseph Sifton. Edgar Morden was evidently anxious for the marriage of Joseph Sifton and the witness to take place, and he did not endeavor to dissuade her from breaking faith with Martin.

Mr. Hellmuth asked witness if Gerald told her that Rev. W. H. Cooper had said to him that he (Cooper) wished Gerald to treat Mary well. Mr. Magee objected vigorously and the magistrate, as usual, ruled with the crown. At this point, an adjournment till 2:15 was made.

FATALITIES
Priest Loses His Life While Bathing—Boy Drowned in a Sewer—Suicide.

CLERGYMAN DROWNED.
Bay City, Mich., Aug. 10.—Rev. Father C. J. Roche, pastor of St. John's Catholic Church, Essexville, and dean of the Saginaw Valley, was drowned on Wednesday between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., near the West Bay and City waterworks. He was 40 years of age. It is not known how the accident happened.

IN A DRAIN.
Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Victor Dube, aged 6 years, son of Wilfred Dube, of the House of Commons staff, was drowned in the new drain sewer near Sweetland avenue last evening. Part of the bank gave way, and he fell into the water, which was six feet deep.

SAVED.
Detroit, Aug. 10.—Harbormaster David Bell, dock watchman for the M. C. R., came down to work yesterday morning about 5 o'clock, and as he was crossing the ferry slip at the foot of Tenth street, he tripped and fell into the river. Being unable to swim he went down twice. Yardmaster Winans dived in and got him to the dock.

SUICIDE AT RIDGETOWN.
Ridgetown, Ont., Aug. 10.—John O'Neill, a former L. E. and D. R. R. passenger conductor, took a dose of arsenic acid here Wednesday, and is hovering between life and death. O'Neill was a very popular man with the traveling public, and this act has caused a sensation. The cause of the rash act is said to be despondency. He was about 50 years of age. His invalid wife is at present visiting in Eastern Ontario.

FOR \$1,000,000
The Harper Brothers' Establishment Sold Under Foreclosure.

New York, Aug. 10.—The Harper Bros., building in Pearl and Cliff streets, together with all printing presses and other equipment of Quebec and with all rights to publish the Harper periodicals, were sold under foreclosure at the New York real estate exchange yesterday for \$1,000,000, to Alexander E. Orr, chairman of the reorganization committee of the publishing house. The right to use the name of Harper Bros. was also included.

ONTARIO PHARMACISTS.
Toronto, Aug. 10.—At the meeting of the Ontario Pharmacy College Council the executive committee recommended, with respect to the interchange of diplomas with the Pharmaceutical Association of British Columbia, that reciprocity be restricted to members of the various provinces who have been registered by examination. In reply to the request from the council of the Province of Quebec regarding the nature of the certificate, issued to successful candidates, who have not served an apprenticeship of four years in Ontario, the registrar-treasurer was instructed to write that council would accept apprenticeships of four years if on equal standing to that of Ontario in the other provinces.

MR. JOHNSTON WILL NOT COME.
Toronto, Aug. 10.—Word was received by Grand Master Lovelock, of the Orange County Lodge yesterday, that the visit of Mr. Johnston, M.P., Ballykibbeg, Ireland, will have to be canceled owing to the death of his wife. Mr. Johnston will sail for home in the course of a few days.
