EAU Season ITALIAN VOLCANO IN ERUPTION!

Stromboli Island Shrouded in Dense Smoke.

TORRENTS OF STONES EMITTED

Ireland Under Coercion-Members of Parliament Prosecuted-Cholera's Ravages.

Rome, Sept. 10.-The volcano on Stromboli Island is in full eruption and is throwing up great columns of fire and torrents of stones. The island

is shrouded in smoke. Mount Vesuvius is showing signs of activity.

Stromboli is the northernmost of the Lipari Islands, in the Mediterranean, off the north coast of Sicily. Its area is eight square miles. It is wholly of volcanic formation and has a constantly active volcano 3,040 feet high with an extinct crater on top, but an active one on the side at the height of about 2,150 feet. On the east side of the island lies the small town of Stromboli. The population of the island is placed

at 500 persons. It was announced from Naples, Sept. 7, that large volumes of flame were issuing from the crater of Mount Vesuvius the previous evening.

BOER GENERALS LEAVE. London, Sept. 9 .- The Boer generals, Botha, Dewet and Delarey, started for Holland today. They were given the same hearty cheers by the crowds as have marked all the apparance of the generals in public.

It is understood that one of the requests the visitors made to the colonial secretary, Joseph Chamberlain, was for permission for the Boer refugees in Europe to return to their respective districts in South Africa without taking the oath of allegiance. Mr. Chamberlain, however, did not see any way in which he could agreed to either this or the suggestion that certain holders of office under the late South African Governments should be reappointed to

their old position. IRELAND UNDER COERCION. The first prosecutions here under the crimes act began yesterday. T. Mc-Carthy, editor; Mr. O'Dwyer, manager, and Mr. Holland, publisher, of the Irish People, William O'Brien's newspaper, are summoned for trial on charges of criminal conspiracy and intimidating people not to take unoccupied farms. THE RUSSIANS

Extension of Indian Railways Gives Umbrage.

BRITAIN WOULD BE FRIENDLY

Cordial Relations Between American and British Generals at German Maneuvers.

London, Sept. 10 .- Russian newspapers are extremely wroth at Lord Curzon's approval of the extension of the Indian railway system to Nushki, on the eastern boundary of Beluchisway communication between India and Europe. Russia means to have an outlet in the Indian Ocean, and this great railway, which would be in British and German hands, would stop the progress of Russia towards the south. An evening journal in St. Petersburg says Russia must at once build a line through Persia right down to the Indian Ocean, and thus paralyze the ambition of Great Britain.

FRIENDLY FEELING TOWARDS RUSSIA. There is a very general desire in this country for some sort of understanding with Russia about Persia, in spite of Capt. Mahan's warning that any concession on Britain's part will imperil her naval situation in the Far East, her political position in India, Revolutionist Admiral Killick Went her commercial interests in both, and the imperial tie between herself and Australia.

BRITISH RAILWAY METHODS. The controversy concerning the administration of British railways goes merrily on. It is stated that the Northeastern Company is preparing a reply to the indictment, which was published in the Times.

ERALS.

Most cordial relations have been established between the British and American generals attending the maneuvers of 90,000 German troops near Frankfort-on-Oder. Generals French and Young naturally interest each other as cavalry leaders, and Lord Roberts and Gen. Corbin are good

IMPRESSIONS OF GERMAN ARMY. The visitors were particularly impressed with the ability and brightness of mind of Count Waldersee. The maneuvers will probaly confirm the impressions formed at the preliminary parades, namely, that the superiority of German cavalry is due to syste-matic arrangements for breeding horses for military purposes, and that the German regimental method of ar-tillery organization is workmanlike and tends to concentrate the fire of guns with overwhelming effect.

The Lord's Day Case.

Toronto, Sept. 10 .- The Lord's Day Alliance will take the Lord's Day case to the Privy Council by way of an appeal from the judgment of the court of appeals. The formal order was taken out yesterday at Osgoode Hall. The court of appeal held that the Do-minion and not the province had the power to pass Sabbath day legislation.
