GAMEY CONTINUES TRADE; ABUSE, SLANG AND INSULT

Calls Defense Counsel Hard Names, Attacks Premier.

AN HYSTERICAL PERORATION

He Says He Will Repeat His Charges Outside the House—Flatheson and St. John Speak.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, June 22.—The speakers of the day in the Gamey debate were all members of the opposition. Mr. Gamey had the floor at the opening of the afternoon session. After begging the house's pardon for any infractions of the courtesies of debate which he might have committed, he proceeded to repeat his sins in this respect, directing his remarks several times to the Premier instead of to the speaker, and using violent language at frequent intervals. He reserved a special measure of vituperation for Mr. J. M. McEvoy. He spoke for an hour, who commented briefly on the fact that the Government was not putting up any members to defend the judiciary. Mr. St. John then took the floor and spoke till the adjournment for the

night. He went at length into the evidence, and quoted copiously from the public prints and Mr. Blake's arguments. He will conclude his address in the morning.

Although there is a large attendance of members on both sides of the house, the city of London remains unrepresented. Mr. Adam Beck has been in the house for only a few minutes since the debate started. His absence is freely commented upon by his colleagues.

Mr. Gamey, in resuming the speech which was interrupted by Friday night's adjournment, said that he wished to express his regret for any infractions of parliamentary etiquette of which he had been guilty. He went on to say that his contention was that he had a perfect right to criticize fully and freely the department of the two commissioners of evidence, or for personal prejudice or bias. The people were the final judges of appeal in the case, and the finding should be open to the fullest criticism. Mr. Gamey said he had nothing personal against the commissioners, but their conduct had been such as to lay their motives open to question. If the word false, as he meant, was applied to the report was an parliamentary one, then he wished to get the next best word to express the same meaning. Mr. Gamey declared that if he could not substantiate the criticisms he had made of the judges' report, he would withdraw from public life forever.

Mr. Gamey then devoted his attention to the methods and character of the defense. It had been reported that Mr. Robinette had been engaged for the defense, but had been engaged. The inference was obvious that Mr. Robinette had refused to do the kind of work required. Underhand means, said Mr. Gamey, had been used in the endeavor to obtain discrediting evidence against him. They had gone to the Confederation Life, of which company he had been an agent for fifteen years, to see if they could not find something discreditable against him, but they were informed that he had been a valuable and reliable agent. They had then gone to the Canada Accident Insurance Company for the same purpose. They were told by the manager of the company that his (Mr. Gamey's) business relations with the firm were above board. These assurances of the Government replied that that was remarkable, as the manager of the Confederation Life Assurance Company had informed them that his dealings with Mr. Gamey were not satisfactory. This was but an incident which showed the dirty tactics adopted by the defense, and it was no wonder that they had to employ such stamps and soundings as J. M. McEvoy to bolster up their case.

The Government had also paid money to go to Manitoba and secure the counsel of the late Justice Minister, said Mr. Gamey, but they were unsuccessful.
