A RAILWAY DAY

IN THE HOUSE
The Act Creating a Railway Commission Is Put Through the Third Reading.

Ottawa, Aug. 10. — In the House of Commons today the charter incorporating the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company received its third reading. This, of course, is not the bill embodying the contract with the Government, but is merely the measure creating the legal entity with which the Government can deal. Nevertheless its passage marks a distinct advance in a long fight.

Another big measure which was put through its third reading was the bill revising the railway law and creating the railway commission.

Mr. W. F. Maclean made an attempt to have the legal passenger fare made 2 cents a mile. He was defeated by 54 to 34. The bill will now go to the Senate, which is threatening to stand on its heels and give full consideration to each of the 363 clauses. There is no reasonable doubt, however, that the House will begin its work each day after Wednesday at 2 p.m. In connection with this, he announced that when the debate on the Grand Trunk Pacific contract begins tomorrow it will be pushed to a conclusion without relaxation.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier informed Mr. Barker that the letter from Sir Wm. Van Horne declining to act on the transportation commission was received on July 25.

On the third reading of the railway commission bill, Mr. Maclean introduced an amendment to make the maximum passenger rate on Canadian railways 2 cents a mile.

After a long discussion this was voted down.

Dr. Sprule then offered an amendment to make the maximum passenger rate 1 1/2 cents a mile east of Port Arthur.

This was lost by 34 to 45.

The bill was then given its third reading.

WILL CALL ON RUSSIA
To End International Complications in the Far East.

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 11.—A number of public men, including Prince Konoze, president of the House of Peers, and Count Ragaki, former Minister of Interior and Kamahy, former Japanese partisan association for the purpose of urging the Government to invite Russia to terminate the causes of the present international complication and establish full guarantees of peace.

THEIR FUNDS WIPED OUT
Absconding Treasurer Allen Is Still at Large.

Boston, Aug. 11.—It was stated with assurance last night, although confirmation by the official of the society was not to be obtained, that the funds of the Methodist Episcopal Society, of which William S. Allen was treasurer, and amounting to several thousand dollars had been entirely wiped out by the defalcation of Allen.

Louis Cates, a life-long acquaintance of Allen, who has been in the west, returned to Boston last night, and reported having met Allen at Rochester, N. Y., Thursday last, the day before the defalcation became public. While the train on which Mr. Cates was coming east was standing in the station he noticed Allen walking up and down the platform. Leaving the train he approached the absconding treasurer, by whom he was cordially greeted. Cates asked the other jokingly whether he was not a long way from home. Allen replied in the affirmative, and added that he intended taking a long vacation as his health was not good. Last night the police were notified, and Inspector Breen immediately dispatched to Rochester.

A Handsome Trophy.
There is an exhibition in the "Slater shoe store window, 111 Dundas street, London, a handsome trophy, which the Slater Shoe Company has donated for a special rifle competition of the Northwest Mounted Police in the Northwest Territories.

The trophy consists of a massive solid silver bowl, elaborately carved, on which buffalo heads and mounted position figures are depicted. The bowl is of ebony, with four silver shields, two engraved with the donors' name and the names of the winners. The remaining ones being blank for the names of the winning teams.

The conditions of the rifle competition are 200 to 500 yards, seven shots, with two sighting shots, any position, with head to the target, drill order, with Stearns hats and Slater Strathcona boots.
