The Monarchy.

This was to have been coronation Bay. Many have been disposed to lightly regard the function, as having merely traditional interest; a relic of mediaeval pageantry intended to enhance the pomp of kings. They should reflect that the spirit of the coronation tite is religious. A portion of the ritual very beautifully symbolizes the gubjection of the King to a higher power, and the royal couple partake of the eucharist, the most solemn sacrament of the Christian church. The ceremony is expressive of the religious character of the British people and is entitled to a reverent regard. It is not a burlesque like the lord mayor's show, but a national act of homage to the Deity.

The ceremonial side of royalty does not particularly appeal to a democratic country like Canada, and we want no mimic court here: but this feeling is perfectly compatible with loyalty to the monarchy. Perhaps it is the only constitutional form under which an empire such as the British could have been built up and welded together. In this respect the continuity of the throne, amid the rise and fall of cabinets and the commotion of parties, has been an immense advantage. It has given a greater stability to executive authority. While consistent with the most advanced democracy, the British system is far more adaptable than the republican to the government of inferior races, which are unfitted for political freedom. In this the monarchy is an integrating force, as in the mind of the native of India, or Africa, or even the aborigine on this continent, the prowess of the British empire is personified in the sovereign. We do not need to be told what a power the thought of the "great white queen" exercised over millions of Victoria's native subjects. Anglo-Saxons under the British flag smile at this imaginative conception of royalty, but appreciate its practical service to the empire. The selfgoverning colonies regard the crown as symbolizing the genius of British Institutions and the unity of the race. It is a common bond, uniting all races and creeds and countries within the empire. The monarchical principle was greatly strengthened by the character and wisdom of the late Queen. and King Edward has given promise of maintaining her high traditions.

The Opposition Palaver.

An official report of the Conservative convention at Toronto yesterday says that "after a strongly-worded speech by Mr. J. P. Whitney," a resolution was carried declaring that the Ross Government had been emphatically condemaed by the electorate, but "owing to the gerrymander of the constituencies, and by a disgraceful tampering with ballots," a temporary advantage had been gained by the Administration "A strongly-worded speech by Mr. J.

P. Whitney" is, of course, to be expected under any and all circumstances. As a purveyor of strong words, Mr. Whitney stands alone and unrivaled. The statement that the Government is indebted to that good old Conservative device, the gerrymander, is not borne out by an examination of the election returns, as we have demonstrated in another article. To say that the Government has profited by "disgraceful tampering with ballots" is such an ob-Vious stretch of the truth that the charge recoils on those who make it. With the exception of North Grey, there is not even a suspicion of fraud. and county judges who have conducted the recounts have remarked on the exceptionally clean marking of the ballots and the care exercised by the deputy returning officers. The county judge of Halton even went so far as to say that the deputies in that riding leaned, if anything, against the interests of the Liberal candidate. In North Grey there were four dubious ballots, but over and above these, the Liberal candidate had a majority. The Government has ordered an investigation, and if fraud was committed it is to be hoped the perpetrators will be brought to justie. If any party has suffered through the conduct of election officials it has been the Liberals. In East Muulesex and Muskoka, Liberal seats were endangered by the inadvertence of deputies, and in Center Bruce a recount. which might have given the seat to a supporter of the Government, was precluded by an act of the returning officer. There is not the slightest proof that the Liberals profited in the least by control of the election machinery. The Opposition cannot raise a moral issue on that score.

The Coronation Honors.

Canadians will not cavil at the distribution of coronation honors. The conferring of knighthood on Mr. Mulock is a merited recognition of his services to the empire, in the inauguration of imperial penny postage. He

vigorous and businesslike methods. Dr. Borden is honored in the same degree for his record as Minister of Militia and Defense. He was put to a severe test in the mobilization of the South African contingents, and showed a splendid organizing ability. He is an enthusiastic and trained militiaman himself and it is conceded by the service that no Minister of the department has taken so active and intelligent an interest in militia affairs as Dr. Borden, or has done more to put energy and efficiency into the system. The Popular Vote.

Under any system of representation by constituencies, a popular majority will not infallibly register a parliamentary majority. The Brantford Expositor points out, for instance, that the Conservative party has been usually represented at Ottawa out of all proportion to its strength in Ontario. In the election of 1882, immediately after the gerrymander, the Liberals were in a minority of only 3,721 votes in this Province, but 54 Conservative members were elected and only 38 Liberals. In 1887 the Conservatives had a majority of only 4,855 of the popular vote in Ontario, but secured popular vote in Ontario, but secured Worked mottoes on the a majority of eighteen seats. In 1891 A hint of wicked eity life the Conservatives in Ontario polled 183,172 votes and the Liberals 184,036, the former getting 48 seats and the latter 44. In 1896 the Liberals again had a popular majority, this time, 3,-637 votes, and got a majority of two at Ottawa. In 1890 the Conservative majority was 8,293 votes and eighteen

In the recent provincial election the Liberals were in a minority or about 4,000 votes, largely accounted for by the Conservative preponderance in the city of Toronto, where the unit of representation is the largest in the Province. The Liberal majority of four seats, under the circumstances, is not an anomaly, and certainly shows no such disparity between the number of votes and the number of seats as four out of five Dominion elections reveal.

SERVICES IN ST. PAULS

A Great and Distinguished Gathering of People.

The Bishop of London and Other Prominent Clergymen Take Part.

London, June 26 .- At the hour when the King should have been crowned great and distinguished gathering almost identical with that which would have sat in Westminster Abbey. gathered in St. Paul's Cathedral. The approaches to the cathedral were lined by silent throngs, through which drove peers and peeresses, colonial premiers, foreign envoys, ambassadors and members of the House of Commons, all in sombre clothes. In the chancel were Joseph H. Choate, the United States ambassador; Whitelaw Reid, the special ambassador of the United States to the coronation; J. Pierpont Morgan, jun.; and the leading mem-bers of the nobility. In the knave about a thousand of the Westminster Abbey ticket holders, mainly women,

were seated. Shortly before noon the big western doors were swung open, sunlight streamed in, and the Duke of Cam-bridge, leaning heavily on the arm of an equerry, walked to the chancel.

As 12 o'clock struck there arose from the far end of the nave the clear notes of the opening sentences of the litany, chanted by four of the cath-edral clergy. Their tones were in such unison that they seemed to emanate from one powerful voice. The choir took up the responses. At each supplication the procession, headed the cross, advanced a few steps and then stood still until the response was completed. Through the kneeling congregation the choir advanced to the chancel steps. A score of the clergy followed and behind them were 10 bishops in gorgeous robes.
Then came the Archbishop of York, Most Rev. William Dalrymple MacLagan, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Frederick Temple and the lord mayor, Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, the corporation, in full state, bringing up the rear. With evident feeling the choir sang the three psalms of the anthem and the singing of the hymn: "Thine Arm, O Lord in Days of Old was Strong to Heal and Save," and Psalm 51 concluded the short service, whereupon the Bishop of London, surrounded by the archbishops and bishops, from the altar steps impressively pronounced the benediction. For a few moments complete silence reigned and all heads were bowed in prayer, after which the almost blind Archbishop of Canterbury was carefully led down the steps, the procession reformed and the congregation went out into the sunlight, gladly discussing the wording of the latest bulletin from

Buckingham Palace. Simultaneously a similar service was conducted at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster. It was largely attended by cabinet ministers, peers, and members of the House of Commons, and was concluded with sing-

ing "God Save the King." From India, Australia and Africa. everywhere where Britons congregated, telegrams announced the holding of impressive, supplicatory ser-
