The channel, the Mediterranean and the Atlantic fleets, as well as the first, second and third cruiser squadrons, are to take part in the maneuvers, under the supreme command of Admiral Sir, Arthur Wilson, whose forces will amount to near a hundred ships, including 32 first-class battleships, all marking the last word in naval construction, and representing the flower of the English navy. It is said that Sir Arthur Wilson will undertake some important experiments, concerning the nature of which much secrecy is being observed, and indeed little has been allowed to reach the public concerning the fact that any rendezvous of England's naval forces is about to take place.

I hear that representatives of the United States navy have been invited, to be guests on board one of the battleships of Sir Arthur Wilson's command, but I cannot find that any other foreign officers have been asked to attend, not even those of Japan, which is noteworthy, in view of the recent discussions as to what the attitude of Great Britain would be in the event of any trouble between America and Ja-
