ST. JOHN'S PARISH

VESTRY MEETINGS

St. Luke's, Emmanuel and St. John's Churches All in

Excellent Shape.

The annual meetings of St. John's, Emmanuel and St. Luke's Churches, London Township, were held on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings, respectively, and the reports presented were most encouraging.

St. John's.

St. John's vestry meeting was held on Monday evening. Rev. Archdeacon Richardson presided, and presented a report showing the work he had done during the year, and spoke briefly of the progress that is being made. The reports of the churchwardens, Women's Auxiliary and St. John's Guild were then presented and found most satisfactory, and were adopted.

Mr. Wm. Graham was appointed rector of the parish, and Mr. S. Newcombe people's warden, and Messrs. G. Carey, McComb, B. Hodgins and H. Marshall sidesmen.

Mr. Carey stated that he had been asked to bring before the meeting that a probable purchaser would like to buy the brick stable and the orchard belonging to the rectory property.

No action was taken in regard to the proposal.

Mr. J. H. Stoneman, Archdeacon Richardson and the warden were appointed a committee to find out the cost of a number of minor improvements that were reported to be necessary.

The resignation of Mr. A. Cummings, who has been vestry clerk for a number of years, was received with great regret. Mr. Cummings explained, however, that he was removing from the parish. A very hearty vote of thanks to him for his excellent services was passed, and the vestry united in wishing him and Mrs. Cummings every success in the new home.

A meeting of the congregation was held following the vestry meeting and Rev. R. Ambrose Powell re-elected delegate to the synod.

Emmanuel Church.

Archdeacon Richardson presided at the meeting of Emmanuel Church, held Tuesday evening. The churchwardens' report showed that after all expenses had been met \$73 65 remained in the treasury. The report was most satisfactory, and will be printed and distributed among the members of the congregation. The addition of a lecture hall or basement to the church was discussed, and many members were strongly in favor of the proposal. It will be dealt with later.

Mr. F. Fitzgerald was appointed rector's warden and W. H. Freepieople's the vestry clerk.

St. Luke's Church.

The vestry meeting held in St. Luke's Church, Broadhead, last night, was very largely attended, and the reports presented most satisfactory.

Archdeacon Richardson presided, and read the reading of the minutes by Francis Eagle, vestry clerk. Mr. Caleb Stockwell was appointed rector's warden and Mr. R. Oke people's warden. Messrs. McKim, Bowman, Nagle and Blackall were appointed sidesmen.

The churchwardens' report showed that the receipts for the year amounted to \$1,438 56, and the disbursements to \$1,433 80. The Sunday school receipts amounted to \$85, and the disbursements to \$42 62. During the year the Ladies' Aid received \$147 72, and paid out \$86 25, and the A. Y. P. A. receipts amounted to \$20 00, and the disbursements to \$12 53.

The assets of the church are estimated at \$7,848 42, made up of church building and equipment, \$6,210 27, the total given by Mr. W. Bernard \$300, do-
